Bishop Chevrolet Co. To Be Auto Inspection Station For This Area

Lee Bishop, owner of Bishop Chevrolet Co., here, announced this week that his shop would be an auto inspection station for this area, and that all the equipment necessary to comply with the law had been received and installed.

Under the new Texas Safety Law which went into effect over the state on January 1, all automobiles and other vehicles using the public roads and highways, will have to undergo rigid inspection annually before they can be licensed.

Bishop stated that his station had not been inspected by the Highway Patrol, but that he expected to receive his official designation by January 10.

As far as can be learned locally, Bishop Chevrolet Co., will be the only inspection station in Cross Plains, as no other applicants have been filed to date.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. E. Brunlow of Cisco; two sons, J. D. Pinkston of McCamey, and Melton Pinkston of Buffalo Lake near Lubbock; and four grandchildren.

A sister, Mrs. Lucy M. Duncan, of Lamesa, suffered a heart attack as she was leaving the church after her brother's funeral Wednesday and was dead upon arrival at the Rising Star hospital.

Burkett Airman Attending Cal-Aero Technical Institute

Mrs. T. C. Strickland, Burkett correspondent, has furnished the Review with the following item she recently received from William T. Holden, Director of Public Relations, Cal-Aero Technical Institute, Glendale, California, about Pfc. Charlie G. Burks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Burks of Burkett. The letter follows:

Pfc. Charlie G. Burks, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Burks, Route 1, Burkett, has arrived at Cal-Aero Technical Institute for a 36 week course in aircraft maintenance.

Pfc. Burks will take the intensive technical course along with nearly 200 other young airmen as part of his specialized air force training.

The course includes basic mechanics, repair and overhaul of aircraft and aircraft engines and maintenance and operation of aircraft under flight live conditions.

The young airman was assigned to Cal-Aero as part of an extensive air force program calling for technical training by civilian contractors.

Cal-Aero, which trained more than 7,500 mechanics and 25,000 pilots for the air force during World War II, was one of two schools in the country selected to participate in the first post war reactivation of this type of training.

Cal-Aero is located on its own 200 acre airport, Grand Central Air Terminal, in the heart of the Southern California aircraft industry, just a few miles from Los Angeles.

Pfc. Burks, who attended Clyde high school, has been a member of the USAF for three months.

Pfc. Burks has been at Burkett and Cross Plains spending the holidays with his parents, and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jay Gould, and other relatives and friends.

Governor Urges March of Dimes Aid

Governor Allan Shivers emphasized the impact of polio on the family, community, state and nation in an official designating the period from January 2-31 for the 1952, March of Dimes.

In an official memorandum, bearing the Seal of Texas, which was signed December 26, the Chief Executive cited the heavy expenditures of March of Dimes funds by the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis in combating four consecutive years of heavy polio incidence.

"As a result of these attacks," said Governor Shivers' statement, "thousands of patients from previous years as well as approximately 75 percent of those stricken during 1951 have required financial assistance from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis."

"No one can predict when this upward curve of polio incidence will be curbed."

"Texas county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis continue to spend annually large sums of money in patient care and health education."

"During the March of Dimes, its sole source of revenue, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis asks for generous voluntary contributions to continue its laboratory research, professional and health education, and patient care programs."

"Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, hereby designate the period January 2-31 for the 1952 March of Dimes in Texas, and urge every citizen to contribute as he is able to the success of this worthy campaign."

The body of a fourth boy was recovered. Missing are Robert Reed, 17, former Cross Plains resident, and Jerry Harrod, 17, both of Odessa, and Harry Kirkin, 19, Abilene.

The body of Shirley Thomas, 19, of Odessa, was recovered. They were lost when their boat capsized.

A small boat will put out every day in a surface check of the lake, engineers said. Grappling operations have been given up, however.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Reed and P. F. Harrod, parents of two of the missing boys, still are maintaining a lakeside vigil.

Woman Dies Soon After Attending Brother's Funeral

Mrs. Lucy M. Duncan, 69, of Lamesa and a former resident of Pioneer, suffered a heart attack while attending funeral services of her brother, David E. Pinkston, of Cisco, at the First Baptist Church in Pioneer Wednesday afternoon, December 26. She was dead upon arrival at the Rising Star Hospital where she was rushed after she became ill.

Mrs. Duncan left the church building at 2:45 p.m. following the services and went to her car. As she entered the car she slumped over in the seat. Funeral home attendants worked with her for a few minutes and then rushed her to the Rising Star Hospital.

Mrs. Duncan was born Lucy M. Pinkston in Coryell County on March 4, 1882, but had lived in Pioneer most of her life before moving to Lamesa five years ago. She was married to M. S. Duncan in Eastland on August 25, 1925.

Funeral services for Mrs. Duncan were held Thursday afternoon, from the same church services were conducted for her brother Wednesday. The same ministers and the same pallbearers were used. Burial was made in the Pioneer cemetery.

**ORDNANCE NUMBER 86
CENTER PARKING**

AN ORDNANCE PROHIBITING CENTER PARKING IN ANY STREET OR ALLEY IN THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS CARRYING A PENALTY AND WITH EMERGENCY CLAUSE.

Whereas: The State Highway Commission has seen the destructive effects of parking in the center of streets and has therefore asked the City of Cross Plains, Texas, to refrain from doing so; and inasmuch as the State Highway Dept. has agreed to pave and maintain Highway 23 through our city except the three blocks already paved and it is the desire of the City Council of the City of Cross Plains to conform to the wishes of the Highway Commission and to regulate its traffic and parking in a uniform way with other cities.

Section No. 1. Be it ordained by the City of Cross Plains that all vehicles; automobiles, trucks, tractors, wagons, buggies, carts, motorcycles, bicycles, implements, trailers, air planes or any other form of conveyance or transportation be forbidden to park in the center of any street or alley within the corporate limits of the City of Cross Plains.

Section No. 2. Any person violating Section No. 1, of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) and not more than Twenty Five (\$25.00) Dollars and each violation of this ordinance shall con-

stitute a separate offense.

Section No. 3. The fact that the State Highway Dept. has asked our immediate cooperation in this matter creates an emergency and we therefore suspend the rule requiring an ordinance to be read at three consecutive meetings of the City Council and it is therefore passed and adopted and it shall become a law of the city on and after its adoption and publication in the Cross Plains Review, the official publication of the City of Cross Plains, Texas.

Placed in final reading, passed and adopted by the City Council of the City of Cross Plains, Texas, while in regular session August 18th, 1931, A. D. The following aldermen voted "Aye".

C. D. Anderson, R. E. Wilson, C. I. Powell, Jesse McAdams and Chas. F. Hemphill.

And none voting "No".

Said ordinance hereby declared enacted.

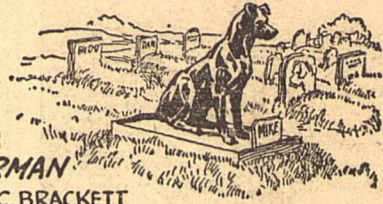

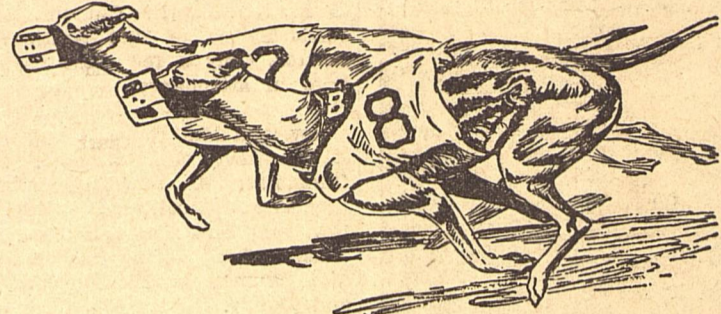

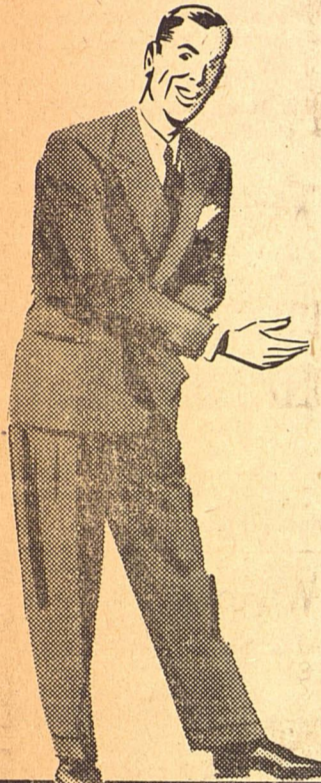

MACK CAMPBELL, 69**

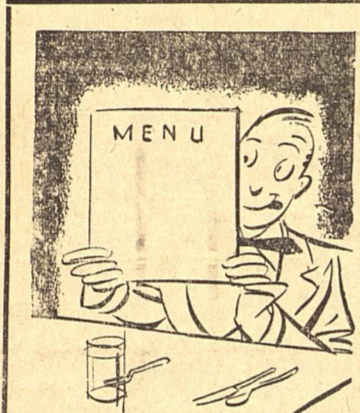
