### STORY OF FARM-NATIONAL BANK BURNS

#### Stock Came Near Destroyed

The whole of the upper part of the Farmer's National Bank and its contents were destroyed by a fire on Saturday. Originating in one of the rear end of the building, the fire had gained momentum before it was extinguished by Henderson,
