City Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING PUBLIC DANCE HALLS AND PUBLIC DANCES IN THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS...

SECTION 1: The term "public dance" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean any dance or hall to which admission can be had by payment of a fee...

SECTION 2: It shall be unlawful to hold any public dance or public hall within the limits of the City of Cross Plains until the dance hall in which the same may be held shall first have been duly licensed for such purpose...

SECTION 3: No license for a public dance hall shall be issued until it shall be found by inspection that such hall complies with and conforms to the health and fire regulations of the City...

SECTION 4: In addition to the "public dance hall" license provided for in Section 2, there shall be required a "public dance" permit...

SECTION 5: No license or permit issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be transferred, unless approved, by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Cross Plains upon application...

SECTION 6: The Mayor of the City of Cross Plains is hereby empowered to appoint three persons who when approved by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Cross Plains shall constitute a Board of Dance Censors...

SECTION 7: The license or permit or both such license and permit of any public dance or public dance hall as herein defined may be revoked by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Cross Plains for the following causes...

SECTION 8: All public dance halls shall be kept at all times in a clean, healthful and sanitary condition, and all rooms connected thereto shall have the power, and it shall be their duty to raise the power, hall or room where any dance or ball is held or given to be vacated whenever any provision of this ordinance is being violated...

SECTION 9: Any person interested in or affected by the acts and ruling of any member of the Police Department in closing or vacating or causing to be vacated or closed, the place, hall, or room where any dance or ball is held or given is hereby given the right of appeal from said ruling or act to the Board of Commissioners of the City of Cross Plains...

SECTION 10: The Police officers of the City of Cross Plains are hereby empowered in the case of any and all dances to enforce all rules, regulations, and ordinances relating to public dances and public dance halls, and are hereby empowered to revoke any dance permit at any time when any provision of this ordinance is not being complied with.

SECTION 11: It shall be unlawful for any public dance or public dance hall as herein defined to be or remain open for dancing on Sunday.

SECTION 12: The provisions of this ordinance shall in no way interfere with private dances given at the private homes of reputable people or with dances given by reputable and permanently organized clubs, societies or corporations, when the attendance is restricted to the members of the society, club or corporation, and their guests...

SECTION 13: If any provision or section of this ordinance is found or declared by any court to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

SECTION 14: Any person, person, society, club or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars nor more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for each such offense.

SECTION 15: The fact that the local conditions creates an emergency requiring that the charter provision that all ordinances be read therewith shall be open, and the entire place shall be well lighted and passed at two separate distinct meetings by separate sessions of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Cross Plains and shall become effective immediately upon its passage and publication as required by law.

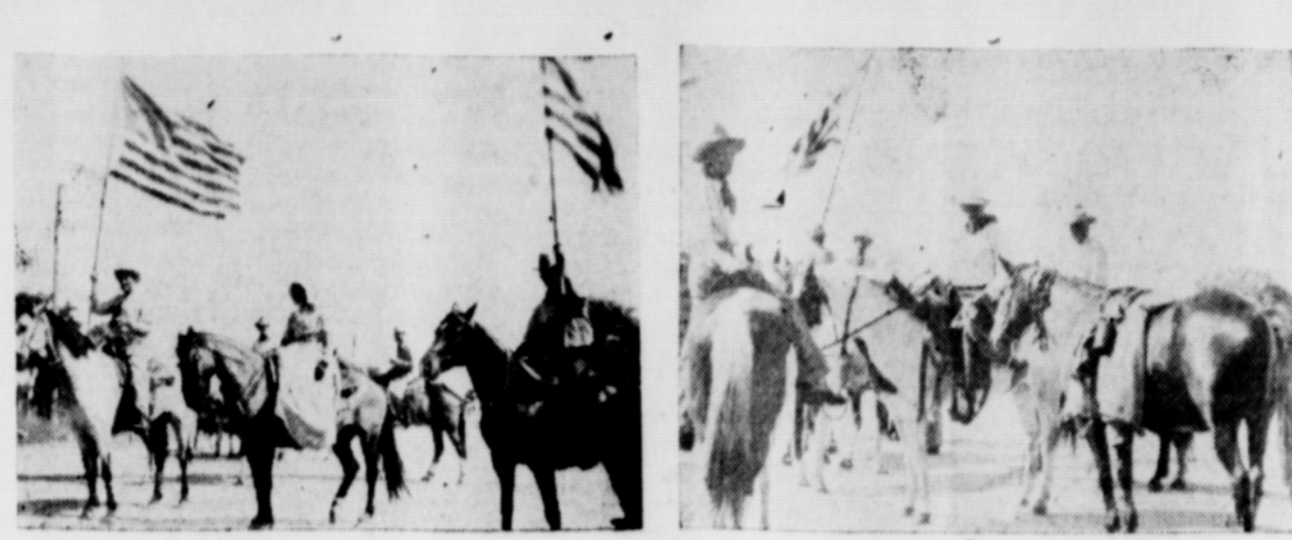

The Ways and Means Committee has approved several amendments to the Social Security Act.
