AN ORDINANCE REGULATING PUBLIC DANCE HALLS AND PUBLIC DANCES IN THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS REQUIRING A LICENSE FEE AND PERMIT FEE: PROVIDING REGULA-TIONS THEREFOR AND FIXING A PENALTY, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

SECTION 1: The term "public dance" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean any dance or hall to which admission can be had by payment of a fee, or by the purchase, possession or presentation home in Tolar Saturday after a of ticket or token, or in which a charge is made for caring for clothing or other property, or any other dance to which the public generally may gain admission with or without the payment of a fee. > SECTION 8: All public dance halls shall be kept at all times in a clean, healthful and sanitary condition, and all rooms connected therewith shall be open, and the entire place shall be well lighted. any member of the Police Department shall have the power, and it shall be their duty to cause the place, hall, or room where any dance or ball is held or given to be vacated whenever any provision of this ordinance is being violated or whenever any indecent act shall be committed, or when any disorder of a gross, violent or vulgar character shall take place therein. It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of said public dance hall to permit any boisterous or disorderly person to enter, be or remain in or to assist in any such public dance hall or public dance; and it shall be unlawful for any person to conduct himself in a boisterous or disorderly manner in any public dance hall or public dance. No intoxicated gross mannered or vulgar person or indecent character shall be permitted in any dance hall, and no person or persons shall be permitted who conduct themselves in a gross or vulgar manner in such place. No indecent, freak or immodest dances are to be allowed.

SECTION 9: Any person interested in or affected by the acts and ruling of any member of the Police Department in closing or vacating hereby given the right of appeal Board of Commissioners of the City of Cross Plains, provided said notice of appeal is filed with

SECTION 10: The Police of ficers of the City of Cross Plains are hereby empowered in the case of any and all dances to enforce all rules, regulations, and ordinances relating to public daces and public dance halls, and are hereby empowered to revoke any dance permit at any time when any provision of this ordinance is, not being com plied with.


