A meeting of all committees on arrangements will be held Saturday afternoon in the courthouse at Baird.

The program has been partially arranged and is as follows:

Beginning at 11 o'clock the morning of the fourteenth, band music under the direction of T. T. Haney, of Clyde; 11:15, address by Jess Hart, oldest resident of the county and president of the Callahan County Pioneers Association; 11:20, history of the county by Mrs. L. L. Blackburn, of Baird.

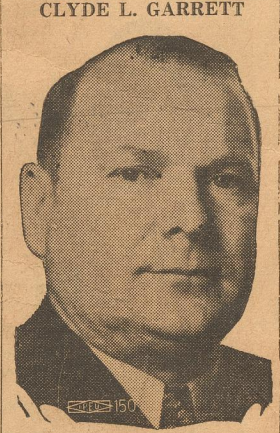

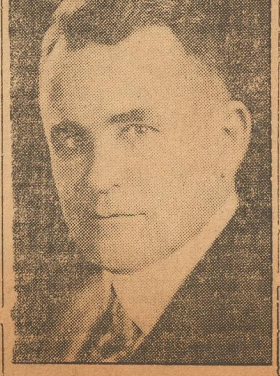


CLYDE L. GARRETT

### RECOMMEND WAYS OF RIDDING FARMS OF HARMFUL WEEDS

County Agent Ross B. Jenkins this week received the following letter from the state agricultural committee explaining recommendations for the eradication of harmful weeds and grasses on Texas farms. The letter is published hereunder because of the interest it is expected to be to farmers of the Cross Plains trade territory. (Editor's Note).

The letter follows:

Under date of July 9, C. A. Cobb, director Southern division, advised that the Secretary had approved the recommendations of the State Committee with reference to the method of eradication of noxious weeds and grasses including Johnsrass, Bermuda grass, blue weed, and bindweed. The approved recommendations of the State Committee are as follows:

That eradication is carried out only on badly infested crop land, location of which is filed with the County Committee before eradication is started;

(a) That eradication is carried out by flat-breaking the infested land, followed by intensive cultivation during the months of July, August and September with a knife cultivator or disc harrow; or

(b) The infested land is bedded and re-bedded with a sweep or "middlebuster" at intervals of not more than 30 days, followed each time by harrow, in order to expose the roots to the weather;

That the County Committee shall determine whether or not the land is sufficiently infested with one or more of the above noxious weeds or grasses to justify payment for eradication; and

That the County Committee shall determine whether or not eradication has been carried out in a workmanlike manner.

It is important that you and your County Committee familiarize yourselves with the fundamental principles of eradication as outlined above. Extreme care should be taken to insure proper compliance of individual producers. The State Committee will rely on the judgment of the County Committee to safeguard any improper abuse of the soil conserving practice outlined in Supplement (j) and method of eradication as recommended by the State Committee and approved by the AAA.

### SCHOOL TRANSFERS MUST BE FINISHED BY FRIDAY NIGHT

Friday is the last day for students to transfer from one school district to another, if state aid proportionment is to be correctly allocated. Those failing to make the necessary transfer before August first will in all likelihood be charged a "tuition fee" if they attend school out of their home district.

Private transportation will be paid by the district or state, provided the home school district is not so classified by the county school board that the proper grade is provided in the home district, and further provided that the transfer is made to a district that is either affiliated, classified or standardized.

In making application for a transfer, the applicant should bear in mind that the two dollars per month private transportation and does not apply, under the present law, unless the transfer is made to a classified affiliated or standardized school.

Under the school law, the obligation of private transportation and high school tuition rests upon the home district provided it has sufficient funds to make payment, and in the event of the home district's inability to make payment the state will assume the obligation, provided the transferred pupil is attending a school of proper classification, an affiliated, classified or standardized school.

Bus transportation will be paid the districts on the same basis as the past year.

Under a late ruling of the department of education no private transportation will be paid unless the home district maintains a minimum tax rate of fifty cents.

Applications for transfer must be made in duplicate and one copy mailed to Austin, as all transfer adjustments are now made by the Department of Education at Austin.

The signature of the applicant for all transfers is essential to the transfer of children.

Blanks may be obtained in the office of the county superintendent.

### ALL LOCAL PLACES SETTLED AT POLLS IN VOTE SATURDAY

There will be no run-off primary elections for Callahan county, all local races having been settled at the polls Saturday.

L. B. Lewis defeated J. Rupert Jackson 482 votes for County Judge, Olaf Hollingshead beat Vernon R. King, incumbent, 230 for Tax Assessor and Collector, and Mrs. Will Rylee garnered 1,499 votes against 1,179 for both of her opponents to win without a run-off. No other county offices offered any competition.

In the State Representative race of the 107th Floritorial District, which is composed of Eastland and Callahan counties, Cecil A. Lotief, incumbent, and Tip Ross of Gorman, are pitted for a run-off. Lotief tallied 4,149 votes, Ross 2,702, and Ed Curry, of Pioneer, was a close third with 2,619. The vote by counties was: Lotief, in Callahan, 749, and in Eastland, 3,053. Ross, in Callahan, 996, and in Eastland, 1,863. Curry, in Callahan, 833, and in Eastland, 1,870.

The complete vote from each of the 20 voting boxes in Callahan county is shown in a tabulated form at the left.

For state offices, James V. Allred was re-elected Governor for a second term over four opponents. He tallied more than 30,000 more than the combined vote of Tori F. Hunter, Pierce Brooks, Roy Sanderford and F. W. Fischer. Morris Sheppard defeated five opponents in the first primary to win re-election to his seat in the U. S. Senate.

Other state officers winning in the first primary were: State Comptroller, George H. Sheppard; State Treasurer, Charley Lockhart; State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. A. Woods.

Run-offs are to be held in the Rail Road Commissioner and Commissioner of Agriculture races.

Senator Wilbourne B. Collie sustained a majority over two opponents to retain his seat in the state senate.

Most interest in this district is now centered on the Congressional campaign, for which Clyde L. Garrett is to oppose Thomas L. Blanton, incumbent, in the August runoff. Garrett led Blanton by nearly 5,000 votes over the 17th district, however, Fred O. Jaye, the defeated candidate, polled enough votes to prevent Garrett's majority.

Jaye Wednesday announced that he would stump the district in favor of Blanton. A warm contest is promised.

## S. J. R. NO. 18 A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as follows:

Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partially by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such retirement fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and/or school districts, and in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the monies paid into the fund.

All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools and colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools and in colleges and

## H. J. R. NO. 9 A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Section 26 of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 26a, providing that under no apportionment shall any county be entitled to more than seven (7) representatives unless the population of such county shall exceed seven hundred thousand (700,000) people; providing for its apportionment in counties of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people; providing for its submission to the voters as required by the Constitution and making an appropriation therefor.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 26, of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 26a, as follows:

"Section 26a. Provided however, that no county shall be entitled to or have under any apportionment

universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand and (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

The above is a true and correct copy.

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, limiting every county to not more than seven (7) Representatives under any apportionment unless said county shall have a population of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative to each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population."

And those opposed to said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, limiting ev-

ery county to not more than seven (7) Representatives under any apportionment unless said county shall have a population of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative to each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas, is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand and (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

**Rail Road Executive Chooses Country Papers To Carry Advertising Program**

Country weeklies as an advertising force in modern American life have no more ardent champion than Harry G. Taylor, Chairman of the Western Railroads. In organizing the program of activities to promote more business, both passenger and freight, in the western area, Mr. Taylor carried out the unanimous resolution of the executives of the individual lines in placing the 6,036 weeklies on the list for Western Railroad advertising.

The first of a series of advertisements for the railroad appears in today's Review.

The advertising is a unique tribute to both the weekly and daily press, because of its exclusive concentration in a geographical area of the United States, extending all the way from the Great Lakes to the Pacific Coast and from the Canadian border to the Gulf of Mexico. The individual rail lines have been consistent users of the weekly newspapers, and what the association is doing in the current campaign is to supplement as a group the many campaigns conducted over a long period of years by the individual members.

In the use of the weekly newspapers, the advertising trade press has called attention to the fact that Mr. Taylor's understanding of the powerful influence of these publications originates through his own experience in that field. For four years, he was editor and publisher of the Plaindealer at Alameda, Kasar, and subsequently for 10 years, he directed the affairs of the Nonpareil, at Central City, Nebraska. The background of these human interest contacts was of inestimable value to him in public life while serving as a member of the Nebraska legislature and subsequently as Chairman of the State Railway Commission. His fairness in this latter capacity led to his appointment in Washington as manager of the Public Relations Car Service Division of the American Railway Association.

In December, 1932, he was selected by the western group of railroads to serve as their chairman and commissioner.

The group advertising activity on a large scale for the Western Railroads began in 1935. At that time a limited number of daily newspapers was used. When the decision was reached to renew the campaign in 1936, recognition was at once extended to the country weeklies so that both important phases in the newspaper field would be included in the 1936 program.

In discussing the progressive work of the western carriers for the current year, Chairman Taylor said: "During the business depression railroads suffered as much as any industry, more than some. Consequently they were forced to curtail advertising expenditures and concentrate what budgets were available in the centers where most shipping and passenger traffic originates.

"I know, however, that the railroad executives, individually, have been desirous of increasing the allotments for advertising in the weekly newspapers along their lines, realizing that these papers and the people who read them are the closest neighbors of the railroads.

"When the executives acting for the Association decided to advertise in newspapers again this year, they authorized us to include the weeklies. This is in addition to their individual line advertising.

"The decision to use the country weeklies is personally gratifying because of my former connection with that branch of the newspaper business."

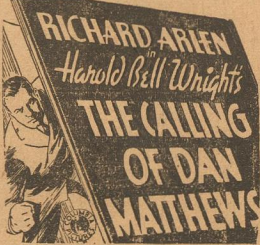

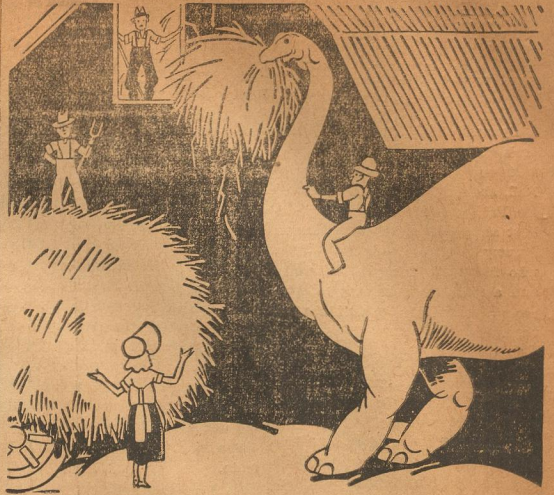
