Vote Here Is For Justice Precinct Six Including Dressy And Caddo Peak

Callahan county commissioners ourt in special session Saturday rdered an election to settle the fate of 3.2 beer in the Cross Plains and Oplin precincts. March 9 was designated as the day for the bal-

Petitions asking the elections had been submitted by citizens of the two precincts, however, counter petitions asking that expense of the the referendums were also on file out that there had been more signers of the petitions asking that no elections be held, but due to the fact that the necessary number of oters had signed the petitions requesting a vote, the law makes it mandatory that the election be cheduled.

The vote for Cross Plains covers justice precinct six which includes Dressy and Caddo Peak as well as Cross Plains.

Last vote on the beer question in this precinct was held April 6, 19-38. At that time the vote was as

Cross Plains Dressy

Due to the fact that the election at that time was county wide, Oplin too was voting on the question simultaneously. The vote at Oplin was 116 for beer and 40 against. The county wide majority for beer in the April 6, 1938 election was slightly more than two to one.

Status of the Cross Plains and Oplin precincts will have no effect on the sale at other wet points, namely Baird and Putnam. In other words, should Cross Plains and Oplin both go dry, Callahan county would remain legally wet. The votes scheduled for March ninth on local option only and would in no wise effect the status of Callahan coun-



Quail May Be Purchased

For the past several years the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has cooperated with Texas sportsmen and their clubs who were interested in purchasing quail to stock certain areas that have a low quail population. There have been about 20,000 qualls trapped in Mexico each year and sold to the sportsmen at one dollar each, this being approximately the actual cost of trapping and shipping one bird. As in past years the Game Department will give one quail to every sportsmen who buys one as long as the supply holds out. At this rate the actual cost will be about 50 cents per bird.

The Department will not make ess than a shipment of two crates to an order. Therefore any group desired by one person.






