Inches of Rainfall Thus Far In '40

An inch and five one hundreths inches of rain fell in Cross Plains in the early hours of Wednesday morning, according to the measurements shown on a government weather gauge kept by the Review. The measurement was made at eight o'clock Wednesday morning, and light precipitations were falling again shortly after noon Wednesday.

From other localities came reports that the rain in many parts of the Cross Plains trade ter-

ritory was heavier, and Pecan Bayou was out of banks at Burkett. No serious damage, however, had been reported.

Including the measurement made Wednesday morning at eight o'clock, Cross Plains has received exactly 11 inches of rain fall thus far this year-1940. Only .29 was recorded in January, then in February 2.22 was received, March showed .42 and April 4.74; then thus far in May (up until 8 o'clock Wednesday morning) 3.33 inches.





Letter Written 64 Years Ago By Grandfather Of Local Lady Portrays This Country In Early Days

Mrs. C. S. Martin received this week from Kansas City a well preserved letter written almost sixty four years ago by her grand-father, B. K. Lindsay to his

daughter in Missouri. Mr. Lindsay was born August 5, 1837 in Jackson County Missouri. In the early days when Kansas City was a trading post Mr. Lindsay was a pony express rider from Kansas City to Salt Lake City. He served in the Civil War and came to Texas after the war, a part of the letter follows:

Rocky Ranch, Brown Co. June 26, 1876 Dear Daughter.

I have not heard from you for a long time and fear something has happened to you. I have written to you since I received your last letter, however I will write again although nothing interesting to tell you more than to describe this beautiful county.

I live ten miles West of Brownwood, the county seat of our county at the mouth of Rocky, a small stream emptying into the Jim Ned, a much larger and longer stream. This stream abounds in fish of all kinds of which we have plenty, your brother delights in catching them, as for myself I. seldom ever

(Editor's Note: The place here mentioned is now under water as it is a part of the Brownwood Lake. Two years ago a grandson of Tarzan, Texas, was fishing at this very place and caugh two nice bass near the spot where the house stood.)

This county is very rough and mountainous but

timbered ridges covered with the finest quality of mesquite grass which keeps stock fat winter and summer. There is also plenty game here such as, deer, antelope, turkey, and a few buffaloes, come in occasionally. There are also panther, bear, the Mexican lion or cougar, many smaller animals such as prairie dogs, civet cats, wild cats, catamounts, coons, and etc. but as I never expect to see you out here hunting. I will stop telling you about the wild animals and talk

about something else, although this is called an extreme frontier county, people have gone out much farther West and settled.

Times are very hard, money scarce especially with me. I can scarcely get enough to obtain the necessities of life. A great many things which we need and been used to all our lives, we have to do without. Still I hope for a better day to to some torse stands

My little crop looks well and is now in full roasting ear and will make 50 bushels to the acre. I mention this because people in Missouri say that corn will not grow to do any good in this part of Texas.

The people here are sociable and generous, always ready to return a favor, not like the people in your neighborhood, self estimated and aristocratic, too good to speak to a poor man. People are equal here. No one thinks himself better than his neighbor. No difference how poor or rich just so he conducts himself right.

There is no one in my

has beautiful valleys and , neighborhood I ever saw before I came except a man by the name of Ward, who was one of my party in the Rocky Mountains and Salt Lake in 1857. Consequently you find me out here on the frontier alone without a single old friend or old acquaintance.

Mr. Lindsay mentions many things in his letter. His last days were spent in Ardmore, Oklahoma.
