

CHARLES STEINMETZ EXPIRES SUDDENLY

END COMES TO ELECTRICAL WIZARD WHO USED LIGHTNING AS TOY

FIXED HIS OWN SALARY

He Was Responsible For Many of the Most Noted Improvements in the Electrical Field

Schenectady, N. Y.—In a modest house on Wendell avenue lies the remains of one of the world's greatest electrical wizards.

Charles P. Steinmetz, who played with lightning and electricity as a child plays with toys, slipped out of life at his home here when his physicians, nurse and family thought he was rapidly recovering from physical exhaustion entailed by a six weeks' lecture tour to the coast.

Not essentially an inventor, Steinmetz was responsible for many of the most noted improvements in the electrical field. All his patents were owned by the General Electric Company, of which company he was chief consulting engineer.

He had no salary with the company, although it was reported he received \$100,000 a year. This can be denied emphatically. Every six months he informed the board of directors how much money he would need to carry on his experiments. Included in this figure was the amount he estimated he would need for "salary" and it can be said this figure varied with each budget.

One of the most interesting experiments of Prof. Steinmetz dealt with electricity or mathematics but with politics, and the intelligence of voters. Admittedly one of the greatest practical scientists his field has ever produced, he ran for the office of State Engineer in the last election on the Socialist ticket.

In the landslide which carried Gov. Al Smith and the Democratic ticket into office the wizard's offer to serve the State for the comparatively paltry salary of the office was rejected by the voters.

BERLIN IS SATISFIED WITH HUGHES' PLAN

Official Quarters Pleased With Premier Baldwin's Plymouth Speech

Berlin.—Much satisfaction was expressed in government circles over the report that the plan of Secretary of State Hughes for the appointment of an international commission to ascertain Germany's capacity to pay reparations had been accepted as the basis of a proposal for a discussion of the subject. It was pointed out that Germany has been a consistent supporter of the program of Secretary Hughes from the moment it was put forward by him in his speech in New Haven last December.

Notwithstanding what was deemed the caution manifested in the American reply to the British Government's "feelers" regarding the conference, official quarters evinced satisfaction over Premier Baldwin's speech at Plymouth recently and what were termed the frank utterances of Gen. Jan Christian Smuts, the South African Premier, in his two recent talks on the subject of reparations. The speeches of both statesmen were characterized as material contributions to the attempt to revive discussion of the question of Germany's ability to pay reparations.

Three Killed on Ship Philadelphia, Pa.—Three firemen on the British steamship Dagild were killed, and several others of the crew were injured in the explosion of a boiler while the ship was proceeding down the Delaware River, bound from this city to Sydney, N. S., in ballast.

Six-inch Snow at Perryton Perryton, Texas.—A six-inch snow drift, which will further delay wheat planting and row crop harvesting.

Large Turkey Crop Reported Brownwood, Texas.—Reports from many parts of Brown County indicate a much larger turkey crop than last year. People who have not raised turkeys before have large droves and old-timers have increased their production.

REPARATIONS PLEA MADE TO AMERICA

Britain Wants United States to Help, Whether or Not There is Allied Unanimity.

London.—Britain has made a striking appeal to the United States to join in an international reparations conference which Britain declares is imperative for the salvation of Europe.

"Europe is drifting toward economic disaster. Co-operation of the United States is an essential condition of any real advance toward a settlement," Marquis Curzon declared in a note addressed to Washington on Oct. 12.

Marquis Curzon asks the United States to help settle the European crisis, whether or not there is allied unanimity in accepting the project. This obviously refers to France's opposition in the past to conference which would investigate Germany's capacity to pay reparations and fix the indemnity figure.

The note points out that the acute development of the economic situation in Europe is coincident with the daily increasing of Germany.

This, it declares, is due to failure to solve the reparations situation, resulting from a lack of unanimity among the powers. Britain has a number of proposals for solution, but none of them have been accepted. Curzon pointed out in his note, which Secretary Hughes replied on Oct. 15.

"America, by reason of her position and history, is more disinterested than any European power," Curzon said. "At the same time she is directly and vitally concerned in the solution of the European problem, if for no other reason than because the question of interrelated debts is involved in it."

He recalled Secretary Hughes' declarations last December and pointed out that both Germany and Britain would welcome action under the Hughes plan, for fixation of the reparations figure.

"So far the French have taken a different view," Curzon said. "This lack of unanimity is, as far as His Majesty's Government is concerned, the sole reason why the plan was not carried out."

The Foreign Minister said, was already formulating an inquiry to the United States regarding the manner in which America thought united action could best be effected when President Coolidge's speech of Oct. 11 reiterated the Hughes proposition.

"His Majesty's Government warmly welcomes the declaration, and hopes they are justified in deducing that if the powers join in such an inquiry America will render the promised co-operation."

It is the firm belief that the American Government has it in its power to render a great service to the security and peace of the world that His Majesty's Government, speaking in the name of the imperial conference, desire to associate themselves with the President's renewed proposal, and they will gladly receive from the American Government any suggestions the latter may be disposed to offer."

DRAMATIC REUNION HELD IN WASHINGTON

Wilson and Lloyd George Meet in Former President's Home.

Washington.—Two veterans of the World War sat together in a peaceful, cozy library, before a blazing log fire, and turned back the hands of time to the hour just five years ago when they stood at the threshold of victory after the most grueling war of history.

It was a dramatic reunion—this forty-five-minute visit which Lloyd George paid at the S street home of Woodrow Wilson, and so far as sentiment is concerned, it was the climax of the little Welshman's pilgrimage to the United States.

They sat facing each other, just as they had sat so many times at the Paris peace conference. Only now there was a pitiful contrast. One was ruddy with health, still eager to smell powder, and perhaps nourishing an ambition to sail back to his country a few days hence and stage a dramatic return from Elba. The other was pale, spent and broken, his life's work done, viewing the world's chaotic scene from the lonely mountain peak of a philosopher.

Lloyd George said afterward he found Wilson's mind "alert, fresh and witty." They talked over the Versailles peace conference and exchanged views on the "general situation" at the present time. That is all that any of those present would divulge.

Nobel Prize for Insulin Discovery Stockholm.—The Nobel prize for medicine for 1923 has been awarded to Dr. F. G. Banting and Dr. J. R. MacLeod of Toronto for their discovery of insulin.

WALTON TURNS DEAF EAR TO SUSPENSION

Attorney General's Plea for Prohibition Against Judge Chambers Set for Thursday.

Oklahoma City, Ok.—With seven counts against him in the impeachment bill being perfected by the Lower House of the Oklahoma Legislature, Gov. J. C. Walton continued his refusal to recognize the authority of a Senate resolution to suspend him and awaited a hearing in State Supreme Court to determine whether or not Lieut. Gov. M. E. Trapp is the legally empowered chief executive of the State.

When the House adjourned it wound up a day that had been replete with feverish preparations for the impending trial of the chief executive.

At that time the court will rule on an application to make permanent its writ of prohibition which restrains Gov. Walton from interfering with the duties of Lieut. Gov. M. E. Trapp as acting Governor.

The Governor stands accused of: Division of public funds to his private use; prohibiting the convening of a legally ordered grand jury; use of his official influence to acquire private credit and property; accepting a bribe to approve a legislative bill; suspension of the writ of habeas corpus; unlawfully preventing a meeting of the State Legislature; attempted prevention of a special State election in violation of law.

Earlier in the day a message from the Governor was read in the House, asking an inquiry into rumors that a large amount of money now on deposit in a local bank to be used in influencing the impeachment vote of the legislators.

The Governor referred to a recent newspaper article which quoted local Klan officials as saying that \$250,000 "to be used in the Senate" already had reached here.

The House did not act on the executive's message. Ten pardons and one commutation sentence, signed by Gov. J. C. Walton before the Senate resolution suspending him from office was passed, were accepted for filing by the Secretary of State.

The Secretary received the documents only after obtaining an opinion from the Attorney General, which held, in effect, that such orders issued by the Governor while the Senate resolution is in effect are not legal, but that those promulgated prior to the passage of the measure are valid.

Those who received pardons include three men convicted of manslaughter. One of the charges brought against Gov. Walton by a committee of impeachment from the lower house of the State Legislature, is that he misused the pardon and parole power "to provide lucrative fees for his friends and associates."

GERMANS SEEKING CAPACITY TO PAY

Hearing Before Reparations Body Asked—New Crisis is Seen

Paris.—Germany's formal application for a hearing before the reparations commission on the subject of her capacity to pay is considered in authoritative circles as having brought the whole reparation problem to a new crisis. The German request was contained in a note presented to the commission by Dr. Mayer, head of the German reparation delegation in Paris.

It is expected that it will bring up an issue between the French delegates on one side and the British, Belgian and Italian representatives on the other, the three latter being known to favor a hearing for the Germans. The British and Italians have been inclined in this direction for some time and the Belgians now are said to believe that the time has come when the Germans should be allowed to state their case.

Motor Vehicles Increase. Austin, Texas.—Registrations of motor vehicles in Texas increased 5,711 during the past week, bringing the grand total up to 647,304, according to figures compiled by the State Highway Department. Transfers number 123,753; chauffeurs' licenses 14,342; motorcycle registrations 3,247 and dealers' licenses 2,662.

Pecan Crop a Failure. Smithville, Texas.—The pecan crop in this section, which, up to a few weeks ago, promised to be a fair yield, now seems to be almost an entire failure and the nuts that are being marketed are of an inferior quality and size. The sweet potato and turkey crops will be very large.

Gobelin Tapestries Stolen Paris.—Two great Gobelin tapestries, each valued at 1,000,000 francs, were stolen recently from the walls of the Versailles Palace.

Bull Weevils Near Kaufman Terrell, Texas.—Mathew Cartwright of this city, who owns a ranch of 4,500 acres near Kaufman, reports 50 per cent of the cotton bolls on his crop have been punctured by boll worms and boll weevils are plentiful in the bolls sated by worms.

Condensed Austin News

Mrs. Espa Stanford, private secretary to Gov. Neff, who has been ill several days, is reported to be improving.

The Attorney General approved \$250,000 of bonds for Orange Navigation District, serials 5s; also \$1,000 Sheerin independent school district, serials, 6s.

Albert E. Sartin of Columbus, Ohio, will succeed James Dysche as warden of the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., on Nov. 1, the department of justice announced.

Representative F. H. Burmeister of McMullen County has been elected and accepted appointment from the Governor as a member of the State Forestry Commission, declaring that he would gladly give part of his time to the work of the commission.

Pardon seekers continue to call on Acting Gov. Davidson. Mr. Davidson has been in charge of the Governor's office three days, but no pardons have yet been granted. Very few, if any, convicts will be liberated on pardons during the tenure of the acting Governor.

There are only twelve cases of dengue fever among students at the University of Texas, according to Dr. C. W. Goddard, University physician-in-chief. Unless every effort is made to get rid of mosquitoes there is danger of the rapid spread of the disease, Dr. Goddard said.

Guy A. Collett of Austin has been appointed by Acting Gov. T. W. Davidson as a member of the University of Texas Land Acquisition Board, and succeeding Will C. Hogg of Houston resigned. The board is charged with the purchase of the 120-acre tract for extension of the University campus.

Assistant Attorney General W. W. Caves has gone to Lubbock for the purpose of closing up the land deals made in connection with the site upon which will be located the Texas Technological College. Mr. Caves will meet with the board of regents of the college at Lubbock.

University of Texas students have received notice of the offer of a prize of \$250 by the Green Mask players of Houston for the best three act play submitted by a Texan or a student of any college or university in Texas. Manuscripts should be sent to A. C. Ford, Beaconsfield apartments, Houston, Texas.

Representatives of all the nurses' registries of the State conferred with Assistant Atty. Gen. Bruce W. Bryant and Commissioner of Labor J. S. Myers. An amicable understanding was reached with references to such registries taking out State licenses and conducting their business in accordance with the new employment agency law.

The will of the late S. E. Rosenberg, Austin, filed for probate, is unique in that it is written in lead pencil on the back of a bank deposit slip and in less than 100 words, it contains directions as to the disposition of the estate, valued at \$80,000, without the use of a single legal term and in clear, direct language.

Dr. H. H. Harrington, member of the State Board of Control, is spending this week inspecting the insane asylums at Terrell and Wichita Falls, the orphan's home at Corsicana and the Girls' Training School at Gainesville. This is done in the routine of his supervisory control over the several State eleemosynary institutions, he being in charge of the division of purchasing.

E. R. McLean, secretary of the Railroad Commission, who has been seriously ill is reported to be improving.

That a large number of mature women attend the University of Texas is shown by the fact that 135 women students registered this year as independent, self-supporting adults. Such students are not governed by the strict rules and chaperone given the other co-eds, it is declared from the office of the dean of women. There are 1,600 women students enrolled in the University this year, and of this number there are 500 freshmen.

W. O. Bower, formerly a prominent lawyer of Houston, was found dead at the State Lunatic Asylum recently. Bower's body was discovered hanging by a cord, attached to a pipe in a room at the asylum. Suicide was the verdict rendered by the Justice of the Peace after holding an inquest. Attendants testified that Bower for several days past had been unusually despondent.

The cases in which condemnation of a number of tracts of land is sought in the program for enlarging the University campus, set in the Travis County Court, were postponed by agreement until Nov. 12.

The State Board of Legal Examiners began examination of applicants for license to practice law in Texas. There are approximately 100 applicants taking the examination. Will G. Barber of San Marcos is chairman of the board.

LESSON FOR NOVEMBER 4

WORLD-WIDE PROHIBITION—WORLD'S TEMPERANCE SUNDAY.

LESSON TEXT—Ps. 101:1-8; Prov. 1:29-35.

GOLDEN TEXT—"I will set no wicked thing before my eyes."—Ps. 101:3.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Taking Care of Our Bodies.

JUNIOR TOPIC—The Effects of Alcohol.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Progress of Prohibition at Home and Abroad.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Fight Against Lawlessness.

I. Principles of a Righteous Life (Ps. 101:1-8).

This is a psalm of David the king, and therefore shows the conduct of a ruler. It is divided into two sections—the first, verses 1-4, refers to personal conduct, and the second, 5-8, to the government of others. This part of the lesson can only refer to the destruction of the saloon in the sense that all evil is to be uprooted and destroyed.

1. Personal Conduct (vv. 1-4). (1) Kindness and judgment (v. 1); (2) wise behavior (v. 2); (3) all malice put away (v. 3); all wickedness put aside (v. 4).

2. Government of Others (vv. 5-8). Only as one is right in his own heart and life is he fit to rule others. As a righteous man he will be against (1) the slanderer (v. 5). He will not tolerate such in his presence. (2) The worker of deceit (v. 7). The deceitful man and the liar are to be removed from his sight. (3) All workers of iniquity (v. 8). It is the duty of rulers to see that all workers of wickedness of all kinds be cut off. The manufacturer and seller of liquor should be regarded as notorious workers of iniquity. Those who blight manhood for strong drink are grossly wicked.

II. The Awful Rains Wrought by Social Drink (Prov. 23:29-35).

1. Woes of Those Who Indulge in Wine (vv. 2, 30). (1) The awful pain which causes one to cry out, "Oh! Many, indeed, are the pains which men suffer because of strong drink. Bodily ills innumerable can be traced to its evil influence. (2) The bitter remorse, which causes one to cry out, "Alas! Many are the expressions of bitter regret which daily come from the lips of the drunkard. (3) Contentions—strife and quarreling. Much of the fighting among men is directly caused by their passions being inflamed by strong drink. The drunken man is always ready to take offense, as well as to give it. (4) Babbings and complainings. The inebriated complains of everything—all luck, loss of friends, of fate and of God. He sees everything wrong but himself. (5) Wounds without cause. These are wounds from fights in which a sober man would not have engaged, and from accidents which are purely the result of intoxication. (6) Redness of eyes. This has reference to the blood-shot eye of the tippler which dims his vision. All these woes come upon those who tarry long at wine.

II. The Attitude Enjoined (v. 31). Look not at it. Do not put yourself into the way of temptation. The only safe attitude toward strong drink is total abstinence, and the only way to total abstinence is not to even look at it.

III. The Drunkard's Bitter End (vv. 32-35).

1. Acute Miseries. "It biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." Strong drink, like the poison of a serpent, permeates the whole system and ends in the most fatal consequences.

2. Perversion of the Moral Sense. This excitement causes the eyes to behold strange things. This denotes the fantastic images produced on the brain of the drunkard. Even when delirium tremens does not result, there are awful fancies which are beyond the possibility of realization. Then does his heart utter perverse things. His moral sense being perverted, his utterances partake of the same. He tells lies; his words cannot be relied upon.

3. He is Insensible to Danger (v. 34). He is foolhardy, even as one who would lie in the top of a ship's mast, where there is the greatest danger of falling off.

4. He is Insensible to Pain (v. 35). The drunkard is utterly ignorant of what happens to him while under the influence of strong drink. Many bruises and wounds the drunkard has which he cannot account for.

5. His Abject Bondage (v. 35). After all his sufferings, sorrow and disappointments, he goes on as a bond slave in the ways of sin.

6. Hell at Last. No drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of heaven (I Cor. 6:10).

GREEK GOVERNMENT SAYS REVOLT QUELLED

Arrests Reported During Day and Martial Law Proclaimed by Colonel Pliastiras.

London.—News from Athens reports the central Government has overcome the Greek revolution. Athens, Macedonia and Chalkis are orderly. Gen. Pangalos has been appointed Military Governor of Athens.

Athens.—Some 2,000 men, led by the royalist general, Metaxas, have revolted against the military Government of Premier Gunatas.

The proclamation announcing the revolution, signed by the Venelist generals, Leonardopoulos and Gargalidis, and Col. Giras, was published in the opposition newspapers and also scattered over the capital from an airplane.

The military government immediately took measures to quell the revolt, which in Government circles is declared to be of no great importance. Some arrests were made during the day and it is reported that the rebels had been dispersed. Martial law was declared by Col. Pliastiras.

The police confiscated the newspapers which printed the proclamation of the revolt, which, it is rumored here, is receiving support from abroad.

An encounter occurred at Chalkis between mutineers and regular troops, but everything is quiet in Athens and at Saloniki.

The generals who are leading the outbreak no longer are on the native list of the army. In some quarters they are represented as leading the movement with the object of misleading the Greek Army. The revolt had as its object the bringing about of the resignation of the present revolutionary government in order that strict impartiality would be shown the voters at the approaching elections.

BEAZLEY WOULD BAN BARTERING OF BABIES

State Health Officer Seeks Reorganization of Board.

Austin, Texas.—Complete reorganization of the State Board of Health by the next Legislature will be advocated in Dallas and San Antonio by Dr. W. H. Beazley, State Health Officer, in public addresses. He has left Austin for Dallas to address members of the Legislature on Legislative Day at the State Fair and will appear before the League of Women Voters and other organizations in San Antonio by invitation, and discuss the statutory changes he deems necessary to increase the efficiency of the board.

In addition to the reorganization of the board, Dr. Beazley will ask for more stringent laws to regulate maternity homes, declaring that the business of buying and selling babies has grown to an alarming proportion in this State. He has a proposed law on the subject and Fort Worth has adopted an ordinance based upon it, much to the gratification of the State Health Officer.

It is Dr. Beazley's idea that the State Health Officer should be an experienced man of the highest type and that in order to get him the election should be left to the State Board of Health. Also that, while the Governor shall continue to appoint the Board of Health, that all terms do not expire simultaneously, but that the terms of two members expire every two years, thereby making the term six years to each and insuring four experienced members on the board.

Dr. Beazley will have other recommendations to make. He thinks the laws generally governing the public health should be revised and improved in a number of particulars.

For Belgium Reparations Plans. Rome.—The Italian government has sent a note to the Belgian cabinet, accepting in principle the Belgian reparations proposals. The Italian note emphasized the necessity of allied solidarity.


Galveston to Get New Bank. Washington.—R. Lee Kemper, of Galveston, has applied to Comptroller of the Currency Dawes for a charter for the United States National Bank of Galveston, with a proposed capital of \$1,000,000.

Killed as She Feeds Pigeons. Chicago.—Trying to feed the pigeons on the roof of her home, Marguerite Snowden fell 30 feet and was killed.

Resigns After Conviction at Paris. Paris, Texas.—W. B. Strickland, former member of the Legislature from Lamar and Pannin counties, pleaded guilty in the Sixth District Court to a charge of offering a bribe to District Attorney Blackburn in connection with a case that was pending in which the defendant was charged with murder. The jury gave him a two-year suspended sentence. As soon as the case was disposed of the defendant mailed his resignation as a member of the Legislature to the Governor.






