### How School Lunch Room Will Be Operated Here

By LEO VARNER

The Cross Plains Community Lunch Program has been approved and it is estimated that approximately 500 students will eat hot lunches daily.

The old Burnt Branch school building has been moved to the North end of the campus and has been remodeled and equipped to take care of present or future needs. The public is cordially invited to inspect the building and equipment at any time.

The pupils will be allowed thirty minutes for lunch and the lunch period will last one hour. Two shifts may eat during this time, each shift consisting of as many as 250 pupils.

Each pupil will be required to bring a plate, knife, fork, spoon and drinking glass and any other utensil that may be necessary.

Patrons are asked to bring anything that can be used in the kitchen.

Due to the increased cost of foodstuff and because the P. T. A. went to an expense of over four hundred dollars to equip the lunch-room only part of which was donated the price of the hot lunch has been raised to eight (8) cents per meal. Contributions of foodstuff will be accepted in lieu of money, but enough of one article must be contributed to feed the entire group. For example, if sweet potatoes are to be contributed enough must be given at one time to feed all who are to eat. However, we will set aside certain days on which one certain article may be brought. In this way several families could give small quantities which would amount to enough to serve everyone. Milk, except for cooking purposes, cannot be accepted. A list of articles will be made and publicized as soon as possible.

Mrs. Olga Banks, former Home Economics teacher in the Baird School, is the County Supervisor for this proect and it is due chiefly to her efforts that this county has instituted this program in practically all the

A committee will be appointed when school starts, to determine the elegibility of pupils to eat free of charge and the parents of the pupils so designated are assured that this information will not be public. For example, if a boy wants to eat in the lunch room, but is not able to pay, he will be issued a ticket just like the others. This ticket will admit him to the lunch-room for one month. No one will ever know whether he paid

Any suggestions for the improvement of this project will be welcomed. This belongs to you as much as it does to anyone else and we will need your cooperation and help to make it the best lunch-room in this ter-

### LET CONTRACT ON HIGHWAY 36 ROAD **WORK THIS WEEK**

Contract For 7.8 Miles To Fill Last Gap Between Cross Plains, And Abilene

A Texas Highway Department improvement project in Callahan County on Highway 36 extending for 7.8 miles on the section from Denton Community to U. S. route 83 is included in the list of new work for which bids are scheduled to be received at the Highway Department in Austin at the August road letting, August 28 and 29.

The Callahan County project is entirely a state road fund project and is to include grading and construction of drainage structures along the section to be improved, including construction of a new bridge over the Bayou.

It is one of a number of varied projects located in 23 counties that have been listed for the August letting. Their total cost will amount to approximately \$2,086,000, according to the estimates.

Much of the new work is for improvement of sections of Texas highways that are a part of the national strategic military road network and on which the Highway Department is concentrating under the Defense Program.

#### VENTILATED CELLAR PROVES BIG HELP TO CALLAHAN H. D. LADY

Mrs. C. B. Young of the Eula Home Demonstration Club finds when she ventilated her cellar properly that potatoes grown this year and onions are keeping well, none have rotted nor have the small potatoes sweveled any. The eggs that she markets are kept nice and cool in the cellar until she is ready to take them to town. This summer is the first time Mrs. Young has got to test the ventilation on perishables during the summer months as she ventilated the cellar early last fall. This is the way the ventilators are, to give the best circulation of air making the cellar not only cooler but much drier. A ventilator is put in the highest and lowest points of the cellar, one ventilator comes within six inches of the floor, each ventilator has as many square inches in it as the floor has square feet in it-example a 6 by 8 cellar would need two ventilators 6 by 8 inches. Mrs. Young finds that her canned foods are of better quality in a cooler and drier storage.


