#### Government Puts Limit On Use Of Machine Tools

WASHINGTON, - The government recently applied a sweeping system of rationing of aluminium and machine tools, directing that defense needs for those products be filled first.

The order, issued to "speed up" the national defense p rogram meant that the supply of those important products for civilian use had been drastically reduced for the time being, informed sources said.

The rationing, known as a mar datory priority system, was an nounced by E. R. Stettinius, Jr., director of priorities in the office for production management. It was the first such industry-wide rat ioning to be ordered since the start of the national defense program, and OPM officials indicated similar rders would be applied to other inastries in the near future.

Nickel- nickel-steel, tungsten, and neoprene-a synthetic rubber were among the commodities mentioned by officials as "probably due for some degree of priority action"


