PREDICTS BUILDING COSTS NEAR PEAK

AUSTIN. — Are you a discouraged home builder? If so, here's good news for you — a University of Texas architect believes building material prices will level off in the coming few months.

"Prices of building materials have just about reached their peak," Walter T. Rolfe, chairman of the university's architecture department declared recently. "As national defense contracts begin to be completed this summer and fall, a leveling off will probably result."

Rolfe credited defense demands on labor and the scarcity of standard materials with causing the recent upturn in building costs. Following the present defense boom, Rolfe believed prices will return to a near pre-war level and then pursue a gradual increase for about five years.

ACCURACY OF FIRE IS A SPECIALTY OF THE U. S. MARINES

Accuracy of rifle fire has always been a specialty of the U. S. Marines, who have won their full share of prizes for skill on the rifle range and elsewhere.

But it is a far cry from the modern high-powered infantry rifle to the old-fashioned muskets, which also were used to good effect by the sea soldiers in the days of Old Ironsides and other sailing frigates.

A wide variety of small arms were used in the early days of the last century, including the musket, pistol, boarding-pike, cutlass, bayonet, knife, dirk, or tomahawk. Each weapon had its use in the days when war vessels often fought at close quarters.

The musket however, was the weapon of the marines. It was usually of the flint-lock, muzzle-loading, smooth-bore type and fired a ball of from one to two ounces. It was fairly accurate at 100 yards, could inflict a fatal wound at 200 yards and had diminishing degrees of effectiveness up to a quarter-mile.

While loading a musket the sea soldier had much more to do than to insert a cartridge clip and manipulate the bolt, as is the case with most of the infantry weapons today.

In those days he had to bite off the bullet from the top of cartridge so as to expose the powder. He then sprinkled a little of the powder into the pan of the gun, snapped the pan to, dropped the cartridge down the muzzle, rammed it home with the bullet on top, and then took aim and fired.

There were numerous occasions when the musketry fire of the marines proved to be an important factor in the winning of sea battles. Their marksmanship was highly praised by J. Fenimore Cooper and a number of other naval writers.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Editor, Cross Plains Review, Cross Plains, Texas.

Dear sir: I read with much pleasure Mr. Mayor C. S. Martin's article in the Review regarding the proposed legislation allowing the cities to get 25 percent of the city dweller's car license fees, and 25% of the gasoline tax on gasoline sold in town stations. I am glad that the Mayor wrote this article, explaining the exact proposed bill. Mr. Martin I consider one of my best friends and I think an awfully good mayor. In my statement of the proposed legislation I was just going by the statement I saw in the paper, supposed to be made by him, and the bill I knew had been introduced in former legislature, to be exact you can find it in the house Journal of the Forty-Fourth Legislature. I had not read the minutes of the Mayors' Convention so was not familiar with the exact terms.

I beg leave to comment a little, on this proposed legislation because an open discussion of my good legislation can do no harm, it can strengthen it. The mayor made the statement twice that I said the bill called for all of the car registration fees, my exact language follows: "To take away from the county commissioners the car license fees of all of the town dwellers." This would be the same fees that the bill proposes, according to the mayor, to take 25 percent of; together with "25 percent of state gas tax on filling stations located within the city limits."

I thought that the bill to take the automobile license fees of the city dwellers off of the country roads, just after we had invoged all of the country schools to bust up and send their children to our school in town, was bad. When there are just a few permanent drainage structures in and still mud-holes like the one South of Dressy the children claim as their own private place to get stuck. Yes I thought that was bad from the town's stand-point, but now I think this gas tax proposal would be a suicide pact of the small towns. In the first place it would mean, I figure, I have no exact data on this, almost 25 percent of all gas tax now is sold in the towns. There would be about enough taxes from the gas sold in the country to pay the army of book keepers that it would take to separate the sheep from the goats, that is who bought in the country and who bought in the town.
