

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



Effective June 14, 1941, manufacturers of all woolen goods, except carpets, rugs, mats and upholsteries, will be required to stamp, tag or label their product to show the proportion of the types of wool as well as the content, other than wool, in it.

"This act," says W. R. Nesbit, Extension Service Animal Husbandman for Texas A. and M. College, "opens the way for women idea at a time. 



The attendance in our schools is much better as children who had to eat a cold lunch do not dread the cold days at school and children who are in need will come for lunch if they do not want to come to learn. It is a waste of money to try to educate a child with a half starved body. They can't absorb teaching.
