FRASER PASSES AWAY

Dr. Fraser, a resident practitioner of Cross Plains, died at his home on Wednesday at 1 p. m., after a long illness.

He arrived yesterday morning on the "Sunshine Special" and services were held at 5 p. m. at the Presbyterian church, conducted by H. M. Peebles, of Anson, pastor of this church.

The services at the church were taken charge of and his interment with the solemn order.

He was married twice and had five daughters. All of his two daughters were present at the funeral.

He had a large attendance, not only from Cross Plains but from the surrounding country.

He was born in what was then the Parish, South Carolina, in 1848, entered the Confederate army at the age of 15; studied law and practiced his profession in Coleman, Brown, and Reagan Counties.

He knew Dr. Fraser as a young man on the Cross Plains branch of the Star.

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MRS. R. A. HENSLEY DEAD

Mrs. R. A. Hensley, aged 82, died at the home of her grandson, Tom Bruce, three miles north of town, on Saturday afternoon, and was buried in the Cross Plains cemetery on Sunday afternoon, the Rev. R. D. Carter conducting the services, assisted by Rev. C. C. Tyler. Except that she had been accustomed to fainting spells, perhaps from heart trouble, she was supposed to be in good health for one of her age. She ate some green apples, so it is stated, that brought on acute indigestion, and while suffering from this she accidentally fell and never recovered sufficiently to speak so she could be understood. She was born in Alabama in December, 1838, and was married to W. M. Hensley in 1853. She moved to Texas about sixty-two years ago. She was converted and joined the Baptist church at an early age, and has lived a good Christian life ever since. She leaves five children living and two dead. Her son, George Hensley, and his wife, of Houston and a daughter, Mrs. Lance, of W. Co., came in on the train on Sunday to attend the funeral. Mrs. W. J. Morgan is another daughter. One son has not been heard from in years, and it is feared that he is dead. She had lived to a ripe old age, and had spent her life well, God being good to her in letting her go beyond the allotted time. It is natural that she pass away, but that does not make her going easy for her relatives and friends.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. at the Cross Plains Baptist church, conducted by Rev. C. C. Tyler, Cross Plains, Texas.

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PREACHED HERE YEARS AGO

The Rev. W. A. Gilleland of Georgetown Tells His Experiences.

The Rev. W. A. Gilleland of Georgetown came in on Monday on a few days' business. He is an uncle of Mrs. George Clifton and a brother of Mrs. T. J. Respass, of Cottonwood.

Rev. Gilleland is superannuated as a minister in the M. E. Church, and spent many years of his active ministry in this section of the country, being pastor for two years at Rising Star and two years at Cottonwood, Cross Plains at that time, 1891 and 1892, being one appointment on the Cottonwood circuit. He was pastor in Brown County for three years, one year in Comanche, one in Coleman and one in Taylor County. He states that when he began his ministerial work in Cross Plains there were only eight members of the church, and when he quit the circuit there were fifty-four. Mr. and Mrs. Ep Bond, Mr. and Mrs. Bagwell, and Mrs. E. Baum were five of the eight members. The Rev. Mr. Gilleland moved to Georgetown in 1904 to send his children to school, and was superannuated in 1908. He has one girl who is a graduate of the Southwestern University, another who lacks but one year being a graduate. All his boys did college work.

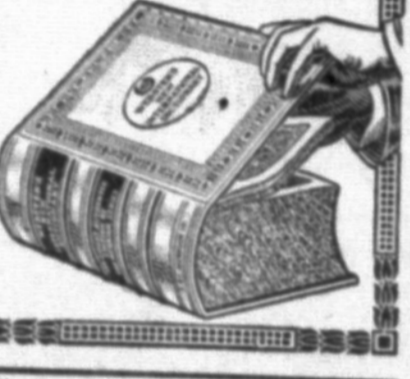

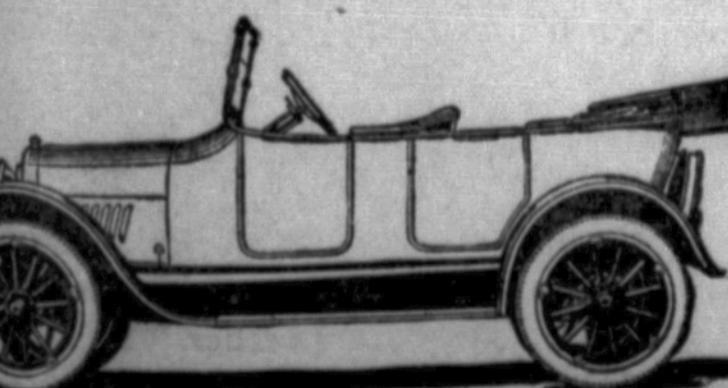
