

bushels. For larger quantities, a 50 ****** axis may be made from a one-inch water pipe about four feet long passed diagonally through the drum and welded or soldered firmly to it. A mixing or bebble board, nailed across the inside is needed to do a good job. The drum should not be more than one-half or two-thirds
