ONE MAN TO THE FARMERS

The year through which we have passed has been a prosperous one for the stockman and the farmer, but especially for the cotton farmer.

A bountiful yield and the high prices received for cotton and other products of the farm will no doubt more than double the number of income tax payers among the farmers for the year 1919. It should be borne in mind by those who have never made an income tax report, that it is not necessary for the government to notify you of your liability. The law places the duty squarely on you and you should inform yourself as to the requirements and comply with them. Ample time is allowed in which your income tax returns may be legally filed; failure to file it on time renders you liable to penalties. Returns (or reports) for the calendar year 1919 may be filed at any time after Jan. 1st, 1920, but not later than March 15th, 1920. They may be mailed to A. S. Walker, Collector, Austin, Texas, or filed with the deputy collector, if one is near you. Ask your banker for an income tax form; if he can't supply you,

write to A. S. Walker, Collector, Austin, Texas, and ask for Form 1040-A if you made less than \$5000 in 1919 and for form 1040 if your income exceeded this sum.

Every single man and every single woman whose net income for 1919 was \$1000 or more must file a report. Remember that your board, lodging and other personal expenses are not deducted in figuring your net income.

Go through your bank book, containing canceled checks, cotton tickets, store accounts and bills and other records and figure up the amount of cotton and other produce sold and other income received. Make a detailed list of the other expenses you have paid from Jan. 1, 1919, to Dec. 31, 1919. Then present your figures to the deputy collector nearest you; he is an employee of the government and will assist you in making up your return without charge; that's his business.

ONE KILLED, THREE INJURED IN LUSK WELL EXPLOSION

Clifton Wilkerson was killed and three others injured as a result of a premature explosion of a nitroglycerine charge Tuesday, 4 p. m., in the Lusk well 4 1/2 miles north of Sipe Springs. The thought the well is rained.

OIL NOTES FROM LOCAL FIELD

The Foster et al well drilled on the northwest corner of the W. C. Hilburn farm eight miles northeast of Cross Plains, the coming in of which on Friday night, Jan. 23, was reported in last week's Review, is the most interesting development in oil circles that has happened in this country for some time.

The well touched the sand at 3,055 feet, according to the best information we can get, and is still flowing by heads at intervals of one or two hours, the flow being estimated at present at fifty to one hundred and twenty-five barrels, which would be our range of estimates after watching the well for four or five hours. The well is flowing through about 2200 feet of eight inch casing, and from eight hundred feet of open hole, in which six inch casing is to be set. Practical men say that if the six inch casing were set a much steadier flow would be obtained and also the chances for bridging and caving in would be reduced.

Just what the well will do and what kind of a field it will open up is a problem that might be worth millions for people to know. It the sand is just touched, to go deeper might bring in a gusher, when the country would go wild. If the sand is shallow, it might repeat the history of the first well brought in in the Gray field, and be a disappointment to all. The well shows a good deal of gas pressure. It bridged over on Saturday, but it is reported that it flowed for an hour on Sunday when it first broke through its bridge.

The well is seven miles east and three miles north of Cross Plains by the map, and four west and five and one-half north of the Star. It lies three east and four north of Pioneer. Its coming in has given an impetus to the value of town property in all three towns.

The Vestal well two miles northeast of town is underreaming at about 3500 feet.

The Odum well is waiting on casing at 1730 feet. The drillers on this well say they have same log as was found in the Hilburn, and have more confidence than ever in their location.

SPECIAL EXAMINATION, TEACHERS

On February 6th and 7th a special examination for teachers' first and second grade certificates will be held at Baird in the public school building. We urge all who would teach school to take this opportunity of being examined. We yet need about five or six teachers in rural schools, the places paying about \$75 to \$85 per month. We would employ teacher's holding second grade county certificates, in the most of these places, as it is now so late in the year.

NEW OIL STATION FOR CROSS PLAINS

Leading the number of other new enterprises contemplated for Cross Plains—two of which, an electric light plant and natural gas supply seem safely assured, the Magnolia Petroleum Company are preparing to build an oil station in the west part of town. A new side track will be put in on the west side of the main track, starting at a point about one hundred feet south of the depot and extending north beyond the location of the oil stations. The steel for the extra track and other materials are now on the ground and we are informed the new oil station will be in operation within a short time.

RIISING STAR OIL NOTES

(From Last Week's X-Ray)

Hill, 5 miles north, is in the black lime and looking good.

Goss No. 2, 5 1/2 miles east of town, is still gassing and drilling is progressing nicely.

The Potet well, 3/4 mile northwest of Goss No. 2, is down about 1700 feet and ready to set 8 inch casing.

The Guinn well, 1 1/2 miles north east of Goss No. 2, is now down about 2700 feet.

The Dunn well, half mile north of Goss, is now furnishing fuel gas for several other rigs in that section. It blowed out a few days ago but has been harnessed again.

Goss No. 1 is still furnishing fuel gas for other rigs and since so much fuel is needed it will likely continue in that service.

The Britain well, 5 miles southeast of Rising Star, was spudded in last Saturday night. This gives test wells in every direction from town.

The Woodruff west of town has not been spudded in, though the derrick has been up some time.

The Blair well, 6 miles south, is again drilling in the black lime. The eight inch casing was lowered Sunday afternoon, and drilling was resumed at midnight.

The Wheeler well, 7 miles south, has a job of underreaming this week. They have been drilling with more than twelve hundred feet of water in the well since Jan. 1st, having found no structure on which to set their ten inch casing.

SIPE SPRINGS OIL NOTES

In addition to four offsets to the Atlantic's Lusk No. 1, about four miles northeast of Sipe Springs, the northeast end of the deep field is to be exploited five miles further in the same direction by the Humble, which it is reported, has acquired a half interest from the Roxana in a block of 1,700 acres located in block 18, and immediate vicinity. This tract lies half way from the Lusk and the town of Gorman.

The Humble has made the location for the first well, which is to be drilled 50-50 with the Roxana company. Block 18 is three miles northwest of the Sloan No. 1, north of the town of Duster, which has been produced 32 barrels for the last 30 days, according to pipe line records.

The offsets to the Lusk will be made by the Atlantic and Republic and the Sipe Springs Company, the latter having made two locations. Lying in the lumber yards of Sipe Springs is material for approximately seventy rigs.

The Humble's small No. 1, offsetting the Moorman No. 1, the discovery of the field, is down 3,100 feet. This well will be drilled

One half mile south of the Republic's Bryant No. 1 and a mile north of town a well is to be drilled on block 44 in the M. C. Smith survey. The deal is reported closed between the Platt-Childress company and local contractors. The Republic's Bryant is fishing at 2,770 feet.

The Humble's Goss No. 2 is down 3,000 feet and the show which the Goss No. 1 encountered last year is expected to be reached at 3,050 feet.




