Only Scattering Reports Of Damage From Smut And Worms Being Reported

With grain fields promising the best yields in 22 years, growers throughout the Crosn Plains trade territory are asking for warm dry weather until harvesting time. Concensus here is that prospects for a bumper grain crop are the best since

Only a few scattering reports of damage by worms and smut have reached here. As yet the crop has not been materially molested by

Estimates on yields have been coming in the past few days that are reminiscent of 1919, when the greatest crops in history were gathered throughout this section. Olan Wilson, who lives six miles West of town, has a crop of oats that has been predicted to make up to 100 bushels per acre. South of town, in the Cross Cut vicinity, large yields are likewise being forecast.

With favorable weather binders will likely begin humming busily about the last of this month. Combines will begin a little later, due to the fact that the crop must be a little riper for this implement to do its best work.

Only a small part of the grain crop throughout this trade territory is insured against hail. Local insurance firms have covered a small portion of the crop. A few others are protected up to 75 percent of the normal yield by government crop insurance, however, the is relatively small, the Review was
