




poet, and he was very much amused. Later, during her call, she espied upon his desk an autographed copy of one of his poems that he had made for a friend.

Sir David Baird, Great British So dier, Reveals His Character in His Student Days.

An anecdote is told of Sir David Baird, hero of Seringapatam, which place was taken by the British on May 4, 1799, and which forms the key to the character of this great soldier.

It appears that he was a student at a military academy at Chelsea, where the routine of garrison duty was kept up. One night he was acting as sentinel and a companion who wished to pass out endeavored to persuade Baird to let him through the lines. "No," said he, "that I cannot do; but if you please, you may knock me down and walk over my body."

Seringapatam was taken and the empire of Hyder Ali extinguished by the death of his son, the Sultan Tippu Sahib. The storming of the great fortress took place in broad day and General Baird was the first to reach the top of the breach after the "forlorn hope." It is remarkable that 15 years before Baird had undergone long and cruel confinement in this very fort.

SWISS TRAINS RUN ON TIME And to Be Exact, They Are About the Only Ones in Southeastern Europe That Do.

The only trains that run on schedule in southeastern Europe these days are those loaded with Swiss goods and belonging to the Swiss confederation. We passed at least half a dozen of them on our journey across Hungary, they being readily distinguishable by the Swiss flag painted on each car.

Each train, which consisted of 40 cars, was accompanied by a Swiss officer and 20 infantrymen-finely set-up fellows in feldgrau with steel helmets modeled after the German pattern. If the trains had not been thus guarded, I was told, the goods would never have reached their destinations, and the cars, which are the property of the state railways, would never have been returned.
