PROBABLY 500 WILL BE COUNTED BEFORE DEADLINE SATURDAY

Percentage In Cross Plains Running Higher Than Over The Entire United States

Further evidencing the patriotism of people of the Cross Plains territory was the fact that 215 had been registered for civilian defense here up to Wednesday at noon. It is expected that before the program ends Saturday night more than 500 will have volunteered for this type of service.

Over the nation as a whole it is pointed out that about 10 percent of the population is registering for civilian work. The percentage in Cross Plains is far above this average, say officials.

Civilians may register in Cross Plains either at the city office or at the office of Cook's Insurance Company. Up to two o'clock Wednesday 96 had been registered at the city office and 109 at the insurance company, making the total 215.

Volunteer workers have been assisting in the registration program. Reports from all sections of the county are to the effect that people are responding to the registration program in about the same percentages as here, well above the 10 percent mark.

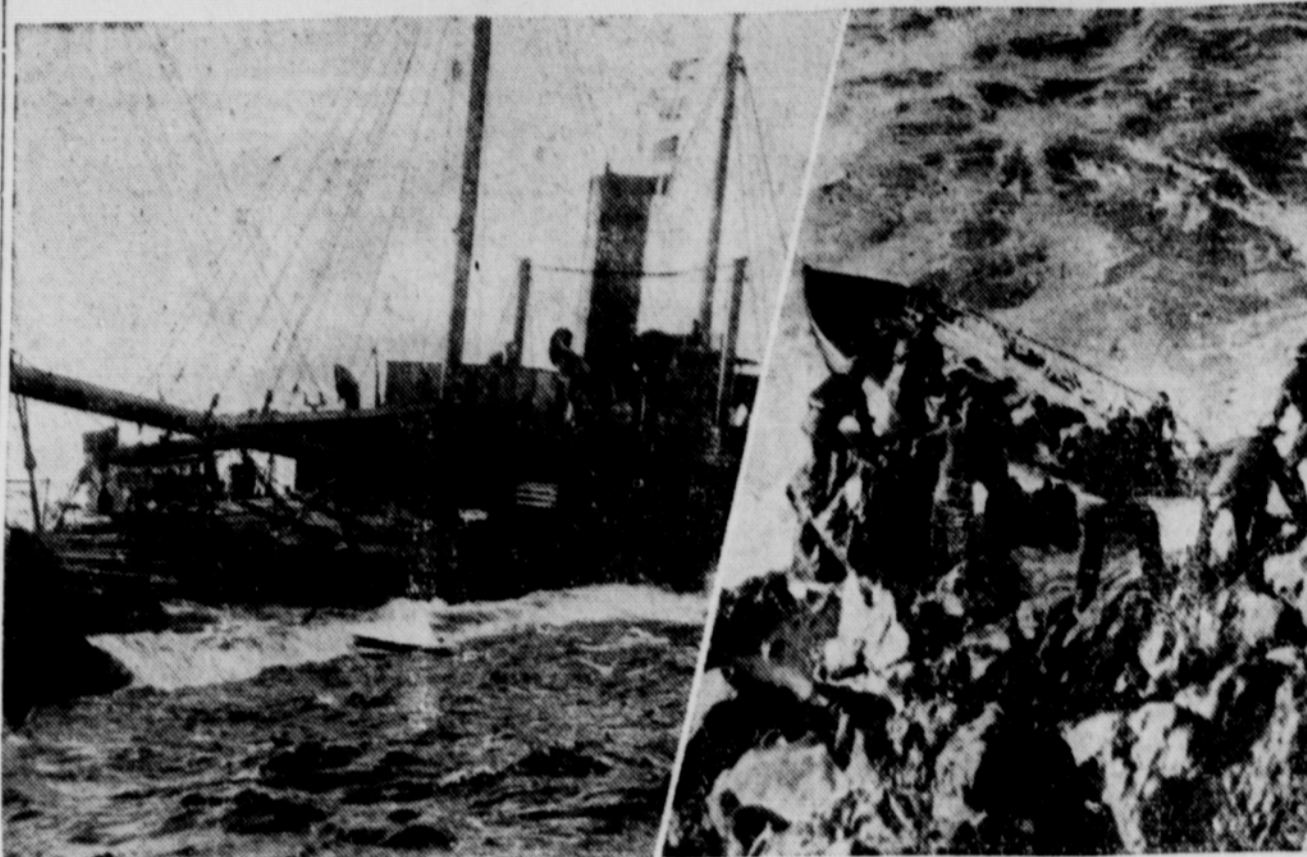

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE
TIME AND MANNER OF PAY-
ING THE AD VALOREM TAXES
LEVIED FOR THE USE AND
BENEFIT OF THE GOVERN-
MENT OF THE CITY OF CROSS
PLAINS, TEXAS

Be It Ordained by the City Council
Council of the City of Cross Plains,
Texas.

SECTION 1. That the ad valorem
taxes hereafter levied by the
governing body of the City of Cross
Plains, Texas, each year shall be-
come due on the first day of Octo-
ber of the year for which the levy
is made and may be paid up to and
including the following January
31st, without penalty, but if not so
paid such taxes shall become delin-
quent on the following day, Febru-
ary 1st, and the following penalty
shall be payable thereon, to-wit: if
paid during the month of February,
one percent (1%); during the month
of March, two percent (2%); April,
three percent (3%); May four
percent (4%); June, five percent
(5%); and on and after the first
of July, eight percent (8%). Such

at the rate of six percent (6%)
per annum from February 1st of the
year next succeeding the year for
which such taxes were levied or
assessed.

SECTION 2. Unpaid 1939 taxes
shall be considered delinquent as of
February 1, 1940, and shall be paid
and collected as is provided in Section
1.

SECTION 3. Unpaid taxes for
the assessment year 1938 and all
prior years shall be considered delin-
quent as of July 1st of the year
next succeeding the year for which
such taxes were levied or assessed
and shall be subject to a penalty
of eight percent (8%) and interest
at the rate of six percent per annum
from the date of their delinquency.

NEWS BRIEFS OF BYGONE DAYS

Little Squibs Gleaned From Files Of Review

June 2, 1933: When M. C. Baum pulled away from the curb at the Cross Plains postoffice yesterday morning loaded with letters and packages, he began his twenty-third year as a rural mail carrier from this place.

He made the first R. F. D. run ever to go from Cross Plains, June 1, 1911. Two of the patrons to whom he delivered mail that first day are still on his route. They are Noah Johnson and Jim Rome.

Reminiscing over his span of service, Mr. Baum points out many changes which have taken place in the delivery of rural mail during the 22 years of delivering mail.

When asked by the Review editor if he could point out any single incident as the most unusual during his past 23 years, Mr. Baum said, "No, it is just from one mail box to another, every day but I like it."

His old horse drawn back has been replaced for faster conveyances. He has worn out eight automobiles and one mail cab since then. Whereas it used to take seven hours to cover his route, Mr. Baum now makes it in less than three and there are more than twice as many boxes.

Mr. Baum has served under six postmasters: Tillman F. Wolf, John M. Hembree, Joe H. Shackelford, Robert H. Deveney, C. W. Barr, and Ike Kendrick.

Save for a single link of one year, which was spent in military service during the World War, Mr. Baum's service has been continuous. He enlisted in the United States Army on June 1, 1918, and was discharged on the same date, one year later. He believes that June 1, is a significant day in his life.

Under the present postal regulations he will have to serve 17 years more to be retired with civil service compensation.
