

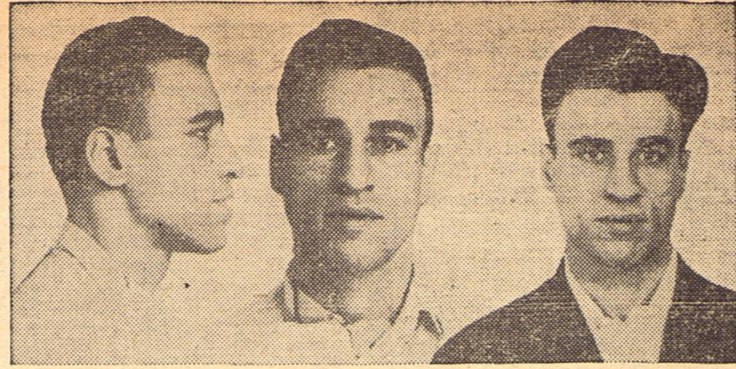

Emphasis Placed on Home Sanitation by State Health Officer

With the approach of warm summer days, emphasis on home sanitation becomes increasingly important, stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.
At this season of the year your State Health Department puts special emphasis on a clean-up designed primarily for the twofold purpose of elimination of flies and rats. These two health hazards can be controlled only through sanitary practices. Places where they feed and breed and rest must be destroyed.
The common housefly has demonstrated that it can spread more than 20 human diseases. Some of the more serious are typhoid fever,

diarrhea and dysentery. They have also been implicated in the spread of polio. Rats and mice have been accused in the spreading of 20 to 30 diseases.
"It is plain to see," says Dr. Cox, "that your health and that of your family and community depends in a good measure upon your maintenance of clean, fly and rat-free premises."
Spraying to kill flies and poisoning of rats and valuable supplements to the sanitation program, but will not do the elimination job by themselves.
Sanitation is largely a personal matter. It is a way of life expressed in clean healthful surroundings.

The senior colors of the high school Seniors served as motif for the decorations Tuesday night when they were guests at a banquet given by the Baptist Missionary Society in the church basement.

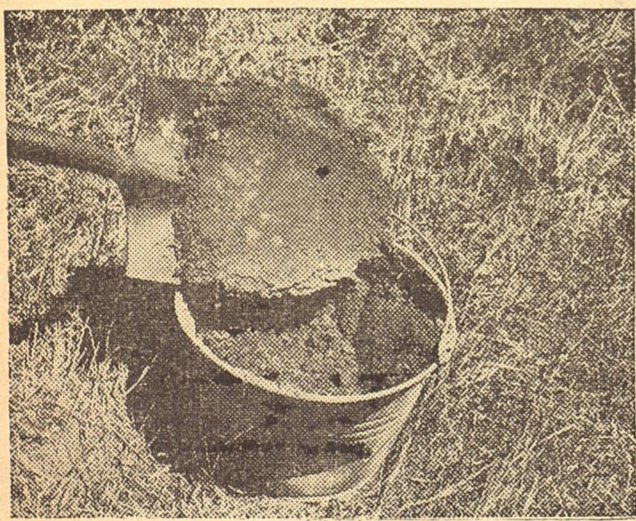

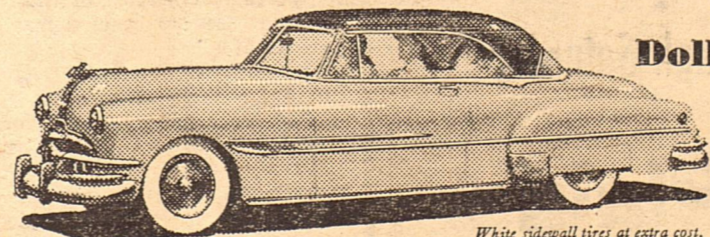
