CROSS PLAINS WILL HOST CONTESTS SET SOMETIME IN MARCH

Will Be First Time Since '34 Event Has Been Held Here; Local School Start Plans

Callahan county teachers in annual convention at Baird Saturday chose Cross Plains as host city for the interscholastic league track and field meet to be held in March.

Not since 1934 has the meet been held in Cross Plains. The invitation to come to Cross Plains was extended by Leo Varner, superintendent of schools here, and seconded by Olaf South, head of the Baird system.

Assured of the backing of business men and the Chamber of Commerce Varner is already laying plans to place the local campus in readiness for the occasion.

W. Goodjohn, Opalin, director of extemporaneous speech; superintendent Raley, of Clyde, director of spelling; Miss Cora Fowles, Cross Plains, director of ready-writers; B. C. Chrisman, Baird, director of rural schools; Socrates A. Walker, Cross Plains, director of athletics; Mrs. Ada Wilkins, Clyde, director of music memory; Miss Couch, Eula, director of picture memory; superintendent Welch, Denton, director of three R's; Jimmy Settle, Baird, director of arithmetic; Jo Katherine French, Baird, director of typing; Mrs. Ledo Dowdy, Eula, director of choral singing; Miss Freeman, Baird, director of one act plays; Mrs. R. A. Short, Baird, director of story telling.

It was pointed out that a feeling of extreme friendliness existed at the meeting of teachers Saturday, and there was no contest in choosing of a host city for the meet. Superintendent South in seconding Varner's invitation for Cross Plains said: "If the meet is a good thing it should be passed around to other schools, if it is bad, no one school should be burdened with it each year."

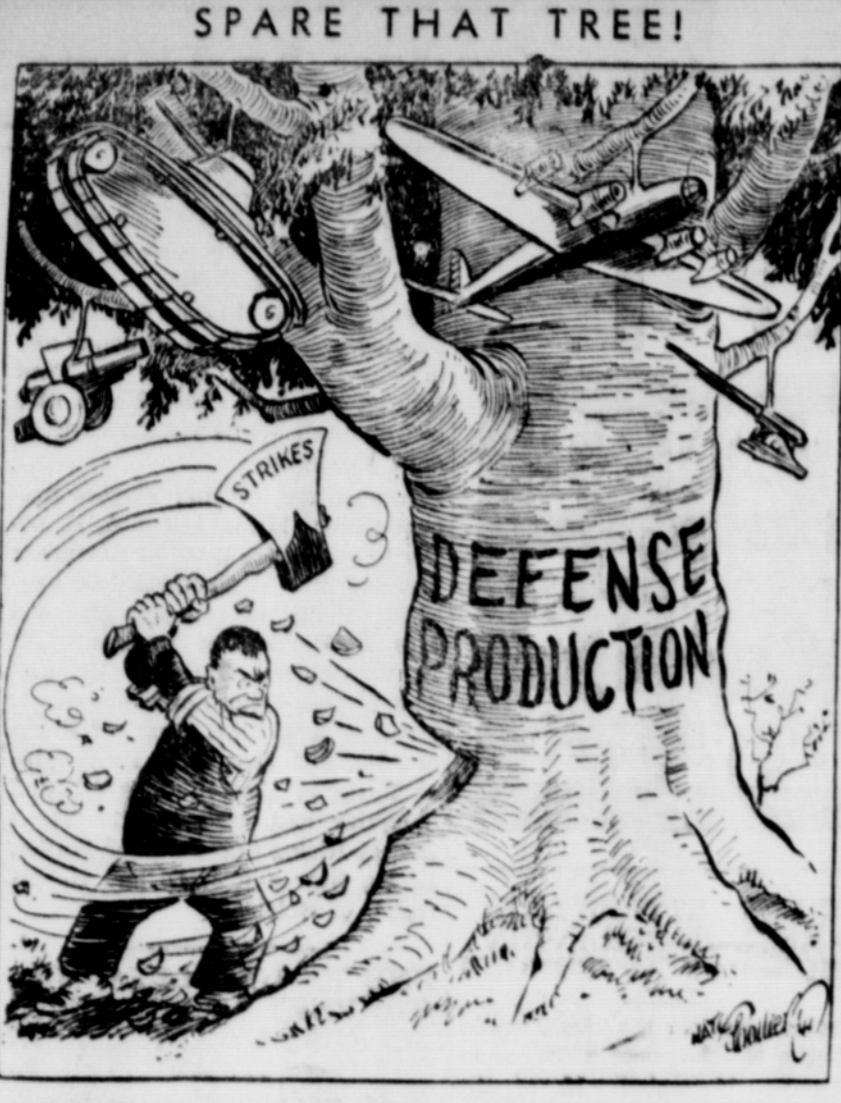
