





Don Wayne Taylor, two-and-ahalf-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Taylor, was found apparently unharmed about 7 o'clock Saturday morning after spending 15 hours lost on the farm of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Atwood, about three and a half miles East of Oplin.

The child was bunted all Friday night by approximately 100 officers and citizens from Taylor and Callahan counties after he had wandered away from a cotton pile on his grandfather's farm at 3:30 Friday afternoon. He and his mother, the former

way patrolmen joined the hunt. The farm includes two sections of land, Nordyke said, half in cultivation and half pasture. It is largely covered in brush, broom weed and feed stuff, and it would have been impossible to see the child more than 10 feet away. even with search-lights.

Nordyke estimated that the searching parties burned out 100 flashlight batteries in 50 flashlights during the night.

George McWhorter of Clyde, a member of Nordyke's party, found the child about sunrise Saturday morning. He was standing with only his head showing above the broomweed about three quarters of a mile from the field where he disappeared.

"When we found him, he looked fresher than any of the searchers," Sgt. Joe Hubbard of the highway patron commented.
