S. S. Tuscaloosa, stationed at New York; and Glenn, in the U. S. army air corps at Chanute Field, Ill.

RECOUNTS FIRST YEARS AT OLD BELLE PLAIN COLLEGE

I was very much gratified at being able to attend the Sixth Annual Convention of the Callahan County Old Settlers Reunion at Clyde, Texas, August 15, 1941. My husband, Joe Cone, and I were very much pleased at my participation in the organization of the Association of Exes of Belle Plaine College. It seems there is a dearth of information as to the beginning and early life of the school. I thought perhaps some authentic information on this might be appreciated by the Exes and others for historical reasons. My father, B. L. Bellamy and family, consisting of wife and three daughters, of which I am the oldest, settled in 1876, when I was eleven years of age, on the South Pecan Bayou. This location was six miles above the old Dr. Windham ranch before he built his new stone house at the head of the stream. My father was a member of the Methodist Church, of which he was a very enthusiastic worker. Although the community was very sparsely settled and was not yet an organized county, he soon contacted ten or twelve people within a radius of eight or ten miles, who were members of the same faith, and organized a church. He succeeded in securing the services of a preacher, who was Rev. Levi Collins. He preached for us once a month under a brush arbor or in our small homes in case of bad weather. My father, who was often a delegate to the Methodist Church Conferences, was present at the District Conference of 1881. At this time, owing to the rapid settling of the county, a discussion on the sore need of a good school was held, and the decision was to establish the Southwestern Methodist College at Belle Plaine. Elder Warren was made President and Professor F. W. Chatfield, Principal. Father came home very much elated and immediately began preparation to move to Belle Plaine. (Please note the spelling of the name, this being the original. It is now modernized.) Brother Warren, the Presiding Elder of that district, died soon after adjournment of the Conference and J. T. L. Annis was made president. He served three or four terms. Owing to lack of time and the inadequacy of funds, the building was not completed for some years after the organization of the college. The first three or four terms were taught in a stone building on the main street known as the court house. This was a double two-story building with class rooms up stairs and recreation rooms down stairs. Here, in the fall of 1881 at the age of 15 years, I entered the first real school room I have ever seen. Prior to this time I had attended or only a few months a very poor free public school. This and a few weeks of private tutoring occurred earlier in my childhood. Until this time I had studied one of the famous old "blue-back" spelling books until I could almost repeat it by memory from cover to cover. Professor Chatfield, principal, with Miss Ada Carlton of Longview, Texas, serving as first assistant and Mrs. Chatfield as music teacher, taught three terms in this building. There were no graduates the first term. At the close of the second term Oscar Jones, Robert Henry, Media Dudley, and I think Addie Day, were the four graduates. Bishop McKler of Memphis, Tennessee, preached the baccalaureate sermon.

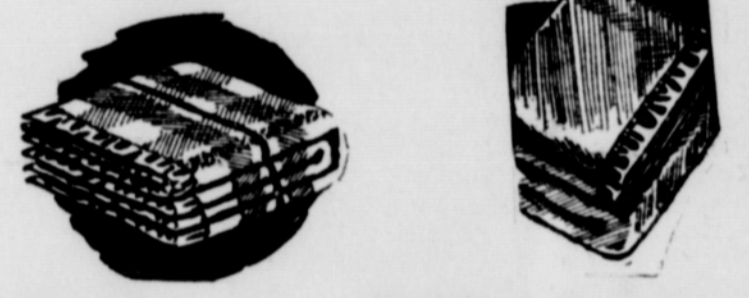
