## Every Car Owner Must Have Title Before December 31

There are many car owners that do not have what is called a title to their cars and think that because they have bill of sale that is sufficient: but it is not.

Section 53, paragraph B. of the Certificate of Title Act provides that the department or any agent thereof shall not after the first of January 1942, register or re-register any motor vehicle unless the owner certificate of title.

If you owned your motor vehicle prior' to October the first, and have not secured your certificate of title you may do so by applying through the Tax Assessor-Collector's office such as license receipt or bill of sale prior to October first, 1939.
