The Gooch Strikes Oil and Gas at 2473

The Litzinger et al well on the Gooch farm four miles east of Cross Plains struck the Gray sand on Monday morning at 2473 feet, and was immediately shut down waiting on oil savers and new cable. While the well has not been tested out as yet, it has a fine showing and its bringing in will be watched with no little interest by the oil fraternity. Mr. Matt Yost, one of the owners of the well, and in local charge of the same, is elated over the prospects. He has been a believer all the while in this as an oil-producing country, and of course is pleased to have such promise of reward for the money and time invested in this and the Albin tests.

That Cross Plains is in an oil producing country can not be doubted by the most skeptical. The Hilburn and the Gooch four to eight miles northeast; the Vestal, a fine showing, two miles northeast; the Gray field ten miles southwest; the Cox well fourteen south; the Pennant gasser seven miles south; the Blair southeast near May; Rising Star field ten miles east. We have had nothing to come in yet to condemn the field. The country south of town has always been looked upon with great favor by geologists, and it has never been tested. Look out for the future of this as an oil country.

The casing has arrived for the West Texas Oil Co., Odom ranch, seven miles west of town, and drill will be resumed at once. The well is now more than 2400 feet, and is top of the Gray sand.

TEXAS HAS 4,661,027 PEOPLE

The Census Bureau announced on Monday the figure, 4,661,027, as the 1920 population of Texas, a gain of 764,485 over the 1910 population. Texas will retain its rank as the fifth state in point of population. The population of the cities in Texas has shown great increases, but the rural population has fallen off in many instances, thus keeping the State from attaining the predicted five million people.

The De Leon population has been announced as 3,302, and Comanche as 3,524. Rising Star has 900 plus, and Cisco about 8,000.

Ex-Tuberculous Patients:

Sanatorium, Texas. September 23, 1920. The State Tuberculosis Sanatorium in its biennial report issued September 1st, gives out some interesting figures on its ex-patients. 424 or 37 per cent of the ex-patients were working at some gainful occupation earning salaries ranging from five hundred dollars per year up to fifteen thousand. Two patients reported that their earnings amounted to more than \$8,000.00 per annum, two reported \$10,000.00 or more, and one reported his earnings to be \$15,000.00. 303 patients had died, 328 were classed as "well", 354 were chronically ill. 141 or 12 per cent were not heard from, and three were non-tuberculous. Of the 303 who died, 211 died from tuberculosis, forty-five died of acute conditions, and forty-seven died from causes unknown. Of different races 1046 patients classified themselves as "American" thirty-five German, ten as Irish, eight as Jewish, nine as Swedish, six as French, the balance being divided among Mexicans, Italians, Greeks, Belgians, Austrians, and Poles.

Vocationally, thirty-eight were office workers, fifty-five were farmers, 174 housewives, forty-two salesmen, twenty-six laborers, twenty-seven nurses, twelve were students. The balance were working at almost every other known occupation.

Men predominated over women among the "graduates" of the institution 637 being males while there were only 492 females. The total earnings of ex-patients amounted to \$385,000.00 during the fiscal year ending September 1, 1920. The amount expended by the Sanatorium for maintenance and salaries during the same period was approximately \$200,000.00

STATE FAIR WILL OPEN MEXICAN TRADE

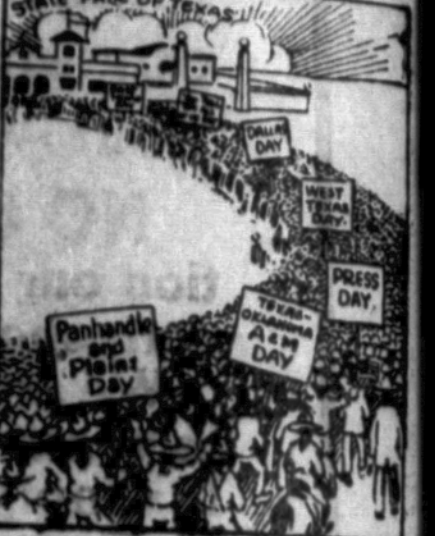
