SUCCESS SECRETS

They say that Dr. Frank Gunsaulus once delivered a \$2,800,000 sermon!

That's how much Dr. Gunsaulus received from the late Phillip Armour to start the Armour Institute, now known as the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Some years ago Dr. Gunsaulus delivered a sermon titled "What I Would Do If I Had a Million Dollars." Mr. Armour heard the sermon, liked the constructive thought behind it and responded first with a million dollars—and later with almost two million more.

I was reminded of this story recently when a young man representing the Churches of Christ called on me. This young man, James W. Nichols, radio evangelist, was about to begin a series of sermons over a national radio network. And as I learned of the wonderful work he and a group of associates have accomplished, I couldn't help but draw a comparison to the early sermon delivered by Dr. Gunsaulus.

Nichols, only 24 years old, started out a few months ago to obtain funds to support a radio program. At first, he hoped only to present his sermons—and the excellent a capella music that was part of his program—on a few stations. But as he began to preach around the country, support poured in from many sources.

From this work many of the one million members of the Church of Christ throughout the country—through their own congregations—have now pledged support. Arrangements are now completed for a full network program.

Nichols has not delivered a "million dollar" sermon yet. But my guess is that he's on the way to one.

Seed Testing and Certification - I

Farming today is getting complicated—sometimes it makes a person long for the "40 acres and a mule" of a hundred years ago. But 100 years ago 85 per cent

of the U. S. population was engaged in agriculture. Today only 15 per cent of the people are left on the land, and they have to produce enough for all Americans and some for export.

To get bigger yields, we are planting better seeds. But seed testing and certification, while helping us improve the quality of our seed stock, is one more complication in 20th Century farming. Seed samples submitted to the State laboratories indicate there is some confusion as to procedure. The following notes should help clear things up:

"Certified seed, bearing a Certified Seed Tag, is seed which meets high quality standards. Certification is not required by law.

A grower wanting his seed certified files an application with the State Department of Agriculture and pays a \$10 annual fee, plus a 5 cent to 50 cent fee per acre for most seeds.

"Registered" seed is like certified seed, except that it meets higher quality standards.

More than 1,000,000 bags of high quality registered and certified seed passed into the Texas channels of trade last year.

"Tested" seed is seed tested for purity and germination. It is required by law for field seeds offered for sale.

The State Seed Laboratories in Austin and Lubbock provide free testing for field seeds. Tested Seed Labels cost 1 cent each.

Samples should be identified with kind and variety, name and address of sender, lot number, or other stock identification, year grown, test desired (whether purity or germination, or both).

Samples should be 2 ounces for small seed like white or alsike clover; 5 ounces for seed the size of red or crimson clover, alfalfa, ryegrass, bromegrass, millet, flax and rape; 1 pound for seed like sudan grass, sorghum, proso and hemp, and 2 pounds for large seed like corn, cotton, cereals and vetches.

The state laboratories tested 14,818 samples last year, and sent out 3,614,083 Tested Seed Labels. (to be continued)

300 Whitetailed Deer Trapped For Breeding Says Game Commission

Sharp reduction in the number of white tailed deer trapped in Texas this season was reported by the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game & Fish Commission.

He said about half the deer needed for restocking commitments were taken during the period which began late last October and has just ended.

The Assistant Director said the total trapped was slightly more than 300. The schedule had called for 600 white tails.

HEALTH NOTES

Pumping 2,500 gallons of blood every 24 hours is the astonishing work done by the heart, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The heart is about the size of a man's fist and is rated at 1/240th of a horse power; it never sleeps, loafs or takes a vacation from the beginning of life to the end. The only rest it gets is between beats. Yet with all the work the heart has to do it does not give out suddenly unless it has been injured or ill-treated.

Under pressure of work the average person neglects his heart and unwittingly abuses it. The chief causes of heart trouble, aside from the deterioration of old age, are rheumatic fever, acute infectious diseases, chronic infections, syphilis, too abrupt return to activity after a serious illness, too strenuous exercise and overweight may be a factor.

Many of the signs which you may think mean heart trouble, or nervousness may cause pain near the heart, shortness of breath, fainting and irregularity of beat. If you have any of these symptoms, do not try to diagnose the condition yourself, but go to your doctor for an examination. He will be able to find out what is wrong and may tell you that your heart is sound. Have a regular periodic examination and follow your doctor's advice.

Veterans ? Box

Q—I'm planning to buy a house with a GI loan. My lender wants security in addition to the house itself. Is this allowed under the law?

A—Yes. It's a matter between the veteran and the lender.

Q—I have a National Service Life Insurance term policy. Now that I'm on active military duty, my premiums have been waived. What must I do, after I am discharged, in order to pick up my insurance again?

A—You must start paying the required premiums to VA, within 120 days after your separation from service. It's best to start paying the premiums as soon as you get out of service. The premiums won't be applied to your policy until it falls due, but in the meantime you'll be guarding against any chance of your policy lapsing.

Q—I am eligible for a pension because I am totally and permanently disabled as the result of a nonservice - connected disability. Will I receive an extra amount of pension because I have a wife and family?

A—No. Under the law, pension rates are not based on the number of dependents you might have.
