

OFF-HAND Observations

During the past week the Ford Motor Company lined up with others asking for the freeing of present wages. The company's spokesman, Harry H. Bennett, said: "Due to the fact that the Government is freeing everything else, there doesn't seem to be any occasion for an increase in salary at this time. The Ford Motor Company is asking that wages be frozen for the duration of the war."

The request was made to the Government in anticipation of a one dollar a day wage boost being considered by union officials. Mr. Bennett further said: "In view of the fact that the Government is the sole customer of the Ford Motor Company at the present time, any increase in wages naturally would mean an increase in the cost of whatever we are producing for the Government. This would increase the cost of our war effort to that extent."

President Roosevelt has cut short the prison term of communist Earl Browder by ordering his immediate release from prison where he has served fourteen months of a four year sentence for falsely obtaining a passport.

Browder is said to have sworn that no previous passport had been issued to him when as a matter of fact he had been given three previous passports under fictitious names.

One of the reasons given by the President for releasing Browder was that it would be a tendency to promote national unity.

Charles Lindbergh has been making a tour of aviation plants over parts of the country. His reports from Tulsa, Okla., said he arrived there piloting a four-motored plane on May 15, and was accompanied by four Ford Motor Company officials and four army officers.

Lindbergh refused to be quoted regarding his new activities.

The War Production Board has decreed that men's shirts be made at least one inch shorter, no pockets and with fewer buttons.

It is said the general appearance of the average shirt will not be changed materially but enough cloth will be saved to make several million more shirts.

The idea for fewer buttons must have been to save labor for the women. Many a woman has had to stop her work, thread a needle and sew a button on her man's shirt, but now with fewer buttons she probably will not have to stop so often unless the new shirts are too tight and the fewer buttons burst off repeatedly, in which case the women would be justified in rising up and demanding in one voice that the shirts be made at least one size larger.

Home Making Hints

Maintain Summer Production Worn Rain plus warm days are increasing insect infestation in most poultry flocks. If the flock has not been recently treated for intestinal parasites, it is well that they be wormed for two or three days. Follow instructions of the manufacturer as to amount to add to the mash. Repeat the treatment in short 20 days. Keep 'em healthy and you can keep 'em laying.

Green Feed Green feed is a balance — it picks up where management may fall short. See that they always have plenty. If tender green feed is not available, feed alfalfa hay. Two pounds per day per 100 hens is sufficient. Soak it overnight in water. This makes it tender, restores color and adds to its palatability. Feed in a trough or slat box.

Grain Laying hens don't need as much grain in the summer as they do in the winter. An easy way of figuring grain for the days feeding is a quart for each 25 hens. Hens overfed on grain store it up in excess fat which undermines the health of the birds. Many chickens died during the summer as a result of fat plus heat. Excess feeding of grain reduces egg consumption and retards egg production.

Mash Keep in eating mash. This one food stimulates egg production. Don't try to be "scruffy" but let her have all she wants. Give her a wet mash at noon—2 1/2 cups per 100 birds, mix with milk or water until crumbly. A good home mixed mash made of home grains and concentrates simplifies the feeding program—can be fed ground stock and laying hens. A good mixture is as follows: 100 pounds (23.25%) protein concentrate, 100 pounds ground yellow corn or maize, 100 pounds ground oats or barley, 50 pounds wheat and 35 pounds at ground wheat, dry.

Produce Only Fertile Eggs Losses from fertile eggs are costing poultry farmers of the United States \$15,000,000 annually. This money would buy 15,944 Browning Machine Guns or 857 guns of the 155 mm. class for the army. Let's stop these losses by removing all male birds from the flock and produce only fertile eggs.

Caring for Eggs 1. Keep a good clean litter in the nests. 2. Provide one nest for each five hens. 3. Gather eggs at least twice daily during the summer. 4. Keep eggs in a wire basket and in a cool place—recommendation M.

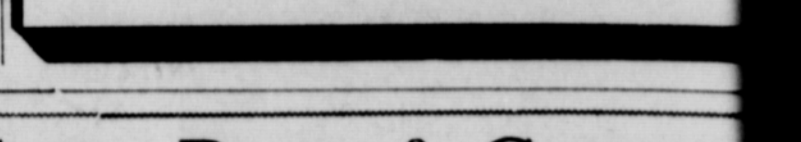

STEWED FRUIT SYRUPS MAY BE SUBSTITUTED IN PLACE OF SUGAR

With sugar rationing in effect, and the likelihood that it will become more severe, readers with cravings for sweets may want to add to their permissible sugar stocks by making some from handy fruits or other sources. Here are some base figures as to the sugar content of common foods, which can be cooked to a syrup and used in place of sugar for many purposes. Per quart of sugar contained in the following staple foods:

FATTEN CATTLE ON YAMS

Alabama's state prison farm of Atmore is fattening beef cattle on dehydrated sweet potato meal manufactured by prison labor. The prison farm raises from 200 to 300 bushels of yams per acre and processes them into a stock feed equal to corn. Farmers from other parts of the state are watching the feed test. Sweet potato shredders are being sold to farmers by implement firms to encourage yam feeding.

The Alabama and Coushatta Indians, who migrated to Texas from the east, are the only Indian tribes which have continued to exist within the boundaries of Texas. Still speaking their native tongue and retaining many tribal customs, they are today living on a reservation in Polk county, Texas.

DEHYDRATED CRANBERRIES

The latest among dehydrated products are cranberry flakes. The cranberries are gathered, washed and pressed, then dried in a simple revolving drum and conveyor system at South Hanson, Mass. This latest development results from the shortage of tin cans. The dried berries, formerly canned, now are put up in cartons. The new product makes cranberry sauce when water and sugar are added the mass is boiled as usual.

ONLY 15 OPPOSING VOTES COUNTED AT 2 POLLING PLACES

District Enlarged To About 150 Square Miles; Reach Valuation Of \$1,250,000

Deer Plains school district was consolidated with Cross Plains Saturday by a majority vote of citizens at each of the two polling places. In Cross Plains the vote was 39 to nothing favoring the proposal. At Deer Plains the count was 17 for and 15 against.
