The faculty will be Mr. Settle, superintendent; principal, Miss Katie Foy, who taught here two years ago; Miss Dora Pyle, Mrs. Daisy Baum, Miss Lillian Robertson, Miss Leo Tyson, and Miss Noble Phillips, the last five being home people.

Mr. Settle held this same position for two years before being elected as county superintendent. He is a live wire as a teacher and well prepared for the work. It will not be saying anything derogatory to other teachers to say that he is the most successful teacher that the town has had since the new town was built. The past year was one of fine rainfall, and already to the middle of August the Government weather observatory at Abilene had registered twenty-two inches precipitation, when the average is only twenty-five inches. As a result of our abundant rainfall, the country never had a better prospect for cotton, corn, and feedstuff. There is some but very little talk of weevil and worms, and if we can escape these pests we will make more of everything than we, short-handed as we are, can gather.
