Gooch Promises 200 to 500 Barrels

The L. P. Litzinger, Gooch No. 1, on Benson Survey, four miles east of Cross Plains, which last week came in at 2473 feet, flowed steadily for nineteen minutes Monday morning. This is its second time to head, making its first head on Saturday morning. It was drilled nine feet after making its first showing on the 4th inst. The six-inch casing was set on Sunday, and the well will be drilled in as soon as the proper storage facilities can be arranged. This well promises a production of 200 to 500 barrels, according to scouts.

The Vestal two and one-half miles north of Cross Plains was shot on the 9th, the tools being lost in the shot. They were recovered Monday, the well showing better in production and in gas than before the shot. For a time it was heard the well was ruined on account of the tools being lost in the hole.

The Greenlee, T. J. Harris, two and one-half miles northeast of town, was shot on last Friday at 1760, and succeeded in freeing a bit which had been lost. They are now fishing for the bit with a fine chance at getting it out. The well will go on down when the bit is recovered, it is said.

The Consolidated C. E. Barr two miles north of town, which was shot on last Thursday, is making some oil and gas thru several hundred feet of bridge.

The casing has arrived for the West Texas Oil and Gas Co. well, Odom ranch, seven miles west of town, and work was resumed Monday. The well is now about 2605 feet deep.

It is expected that the Odom will get production in the Gray sand, the well now being on top of this sand.

The Litzinger, Gooch, four miles east of town, flowed again on Tuesday morning for thirty minutes.

DALLAS TO ENTERTAIN ALL CHILDREN AT FAIR

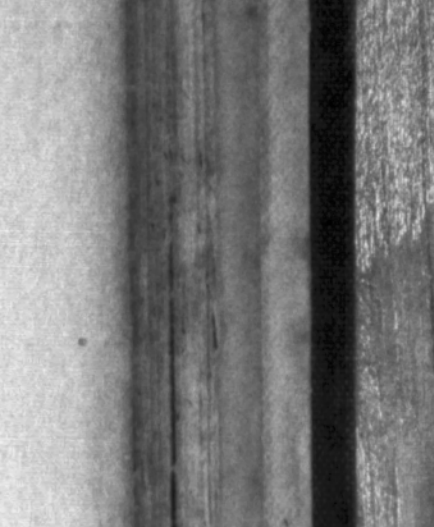

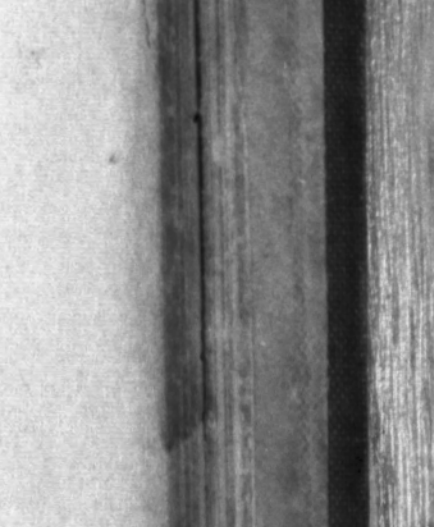
