Equipment necessary for making kraut includes a stone jar or keg holding from four to ten gallons...

Clean and scald all equipment to be used securing a pure salt such as cheese or dairy salt.

Weight out five pounds of cabbage and two ounces of salt. Shred cabbage directly into jar or keg...

Prepare another five pounds of cabbage weigh out two ounces of salt and continue in the same similar manner.

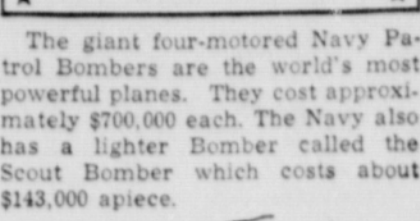
