Rail Road Claims Loss For Years Of 1941 And '42 in Petetion To I. C. C.

he I.C.C. this week declared that railroad and that as soon as they were returned a hearing would be et and officials of all cities along the route notified. The I.C.C. also acknowledged receipt of protests filed by the peoples of Cross Plains, Rising Star and DeLeon.

Petetion filed by the road with the I.C.C. contended that the line had been operated at a loss during 1941 and 1942 and that prospects for increased business were not immediately apparent. In contridiction, people of Cross Plains point out that the loss is of a temporary nature as a result of the war, and in substantiation of this fact consufficient cars to big shippers who have been denied them, the line would be operating at a profit rather than a loss. From other towns along the line come similar reports. "If instead of abandoning the line the M.K.& T. people would give us six days a week service, we would really load them down with freight," said several local merchants Tuesday at noon at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Luncheon Club, at which the railroad subject was the principal topic of discussion.

They further pointed out that thrice a week service prevented merchants from using the line for anything needed from Fort Worth or Dallas in less than a week. It railroad would give six days a week service most every Cross Plains business concern would agree




