# ALREADY DAMAGED

Immediate Moisture Would Revive Peanuts And Be Of Value To Pastures

The Cross Plains trade territory s beginning to feel the ill effects of dry weather. Farmers say that forage crops, peanuts, pastures and gardens are in immediate need of rain. Cotton is not suffering appreciably at present but it is pointed out that within a week or 10 days it too will begin to feel the pinch of drouth.

Last rain of any consequence was received in Cross Plains, according to government weather records kept by the Review, on July third at which time 1.40 inches fell here. In June, however, 5.52 inches were recorded here. Rainfall for 1942 to date here is 23.35 inches. Elsewhere on this page is printed chart showing the rainfall by months for the past three years.

Farmers inform that peanuts although they have already begun to suffer would not be materially hurt if a good "gully washing" rain were immediately forthcoming. Forage crops, such as: Maize, Federita, Highari and Red Top have been the first crops to experience reduced yields for the want of moisture.
