Joe Frank Ferrell Dies From Injuries Received In Wreck

Joe Frank Ferrell, 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Ferrell who lives 412 E. 1st St. of Cross Plains, died early Friday morning in a Coleman hospital of injuries sustained in an automobile wreck here Thursday afternoon. Funeral services were conducted from the family residence Saturday afternoon with Rev. C. D. Wooten, local Methodist pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. C. E. Poe, Baptist pastor, Internment was made in the Drossy cemetery.

Joe Frank had started to leave the picnic grounds with other youthful companions Thursday afternoon when the tragedy occurred. The boys were picked up by a passing car and had ridden only a very short distance when the car on which they were riding was sideswiped by an approaching automobile. Still another car which was passing at the time, figured into the collision. Seeing that Joe Frank was mortally wounded he was not removed until an ambulance could be secured. He was then rushed to a Coleman hospital. His injuries were found to be very grave and the smiling, lovable lad died early Friday morning.

Friends crowded the premises of the Ferrell place Saturday afternoon for the funeral service and a great procession of automobiles and people followed the remains to the little Drossy cemetery for the last rites.

Joe Frank was born July 7, 1930, and was 12 years and 10 days of age at the time of his death. He is survived by his parents, two grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Ferrell, of Santa Anna and a host of other relatives and friends.

ONLY TWO COUNTY POSTS CONTESTED AND INTEREST LOW

Returns Will Be Received In Cross Plains; To Know Result Early Saturday Nite

Texas Democrats will go to the polls Saturday to name their favorites in the first primary. Due to intense interest in the senatorial race around one million votes are expected to be polled.

Political prognosticators figure approximately 2,800 votes will be tabulated in Callahan county. Cross Plains is likely to tabulate in the neighborhood of 450.

No county races in Callahan county commissioner places which are decided by precinct vote rather than county wide, offer more than two candidates for a single office. In fact, there are only two county posts in which as many as two different candidates are vying. Those are for Sheriff where C. R. Nurdyke, incumbent, and Lee Ivey are running; and for county superintendent in which B. C. Chrisman, incumbent, and Mrs. Sidney Foy are candidates. All precincts with the exception of the Baird-Clyde precinct, however, offer warm commissioner races.

Arrangements are expected to be made in Cross Plains to receive the returns here Saturday night as soon as they are announced from the several Callahan county voting places.

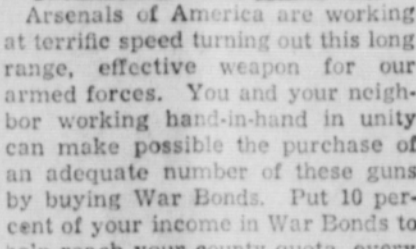

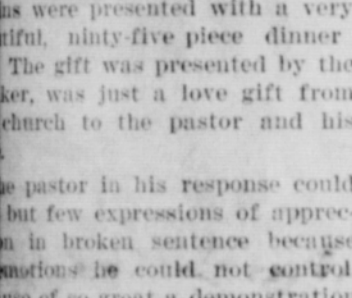

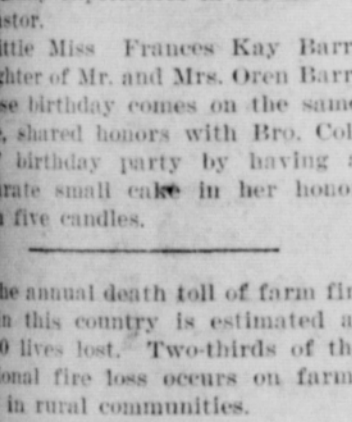

September 2, 1932: An eight pound baby girl was born to Mr. and Mrs. Roy Kirkland, who live on the Harrell ranch five miles south of Cross Plains, Wednesday morning.

September 16, 1932: Some potato, but no baloney! The Review has on display a sweet potato weighing six pounds. The vegetable measures 22 and one-half inches in circumference.

Head shaved and ready Terrell Hardin, local youth, is waiting in the county jail at Baird for "Uncle Bud's" wagon to take him to the state penitentiary for seven year stay.

Hardin was given two years on charges of theft and a five year suspended sentence became active when he failed to comply with its specification.

He was captured in Kilgore, where he had been staying after a commutation from Sheriff Robert L. Edwards to officers of that section to be on the look-out for him.

18 VOTES BETWEEN HIGH AND LOW MEN IN TIGHTEST RACE

J. M. McMillan and J. W. Lacy Go Into Run-Off; Clifton Behind Only Three Votes

Closely contested races were the highlights of the first Democratic primary in both Callahan county and the state Saturday.

Warmest race over the state as a whole was that for the United States senate. Final returns announced by the Texas Election Bureau place W. Lee O'Daniel and James V. Alfred, both former governors in the run-off.

In Callahan county, where 2,973 votes were tabulated Saturday, all races were settled with the exception of county commissioner places in three precincts which go into the run-off primary for final verdict.

Of principal interest to voters of Callahan county preceding four, which includes Cross Plains, Cottonwood, Dressy, Atwell and Caddo Peak, was the commissioner's race. The contest between J. M. McMillan, incumbent, and J. W. Lacy and George Clifton was believed to be the closest three way race ever witnessed here. McMillan led Lacy by 15 votes and Lacy was three ahead of Clifton, making a difference of only 18 votes between the high and low men.

Despite the fact that he literally ran away with the vote gathering in his home county, Cleve Callaway was defeated for State Representative from the 107th floridal district by Omar Burkett, incumbent. Burkett's overwhelming lead in his home county of Eastland put him far ahead in the final tabulation.

A tabulated chart printed elsewhere in this issue of the Review gives the votes of the various candidates at all Callahan county boxes, together with their final totals.
