





Farm people have indicated that they are willing to cooperate in voluntarily sharing the meat. Farm families reached through the Victory Leader set-up in Callahan County, are willing to limit their consumption of their own homegrown meat in compliance with the government's request.

To meet the needs of our armed forces and our allies, the government has limited the amount of meat available for civilians. This amount was divided among the 128,000,000 of us who are civilians. If some of us eat more than our share, it means that our neighbor must do without or have less than s rightfully his share. To share fairly, all civilians are

isked to keep their consumption of person per week; for children 6 to per week; for children from infancy to 6 years, 3-4 lb. per person per week. This applies to beef, pork, (including bacon and salt pork) veal, lamb, mutton. It does not apply to poultry, fish, and the variety meats such as liver, kidney, brains, sweetbreads, and tongue. These can be used freely and do not have to be counted in the 2 1-5 lbs. Many families find that they do not use more than the amount specified in the Share-the-Meat program. They will not need to make any diet changes where meat is concerned in the present set-up. But the families who do use more will have to adjust their menus to cut down to the requested amount by using more meat substitutes.

Voluntary meat rationing is not a program for national meatless days for such a program runs the risk of not cutting consumption where it should be cut or of failing to cut or of failing to cut consumption anywhere. In World War 1,


