DROUGHT BECOMES DAMAGING

MANY FARMERS ARE HAULING WATER TO THEIR LIVESTOCK

Corn Suffers But Good Rain Could Yet Make Yield Of About Normal Proportion

Farmers throughout the Cross Plains trade territory are beginning to feel the pinch of vanishing supplies of stock water. Many have been hauling for their livestock and for domestic purposes for the past several weeks.

Unless good rains are forthcoming within the very near future, it is pointed out, the stock water situation may reach alarming proportions. Records on rainfall kept here by S. F. Bond reveal that it has been more than a year since stock water in appreciable amounts was received.

Crops generally are not suffering, however, corn yields will be cut in half if moisture doesn't arrive within the week, say growers. It is not too late, however, to make a near normal yield if rain comes within the next few days.

Bill Lawrence, who lives West of town, was making arrangements Saturday afternoon to haul stock water from Cross Plains. He reported that the tank from which he had been hauling for the past month was about gone. Several of his neighbors were in about the same situation for water he said.

Pasture Blaze 15 Miles West Here Burns 2,000 Acres

A prairie fire swept across three ranches and a farm 15 miles West of here Thursday burning off approximately 2,000 acres of grass land and a Johnson grass field. Only stillness of the day prevented the fire from spreading.

The fire started in a Johnson grass field on the N. B. Holloway farm where baling of hay was in progress. The field was burned off and some baled hay lost. The fire then spread to the ranch of Jane Patton Hall, burning to the East side of a 1,000 acre tract, then to the Frank Windham place, back across the Hall land and then to the Larmer Henry pasture.

Farmers and ranchers of the area joined in the fight against the flame, which simmered until dusk.

It was the worst prairie fire in this locality in a number of years. No livestock, however, was lost.

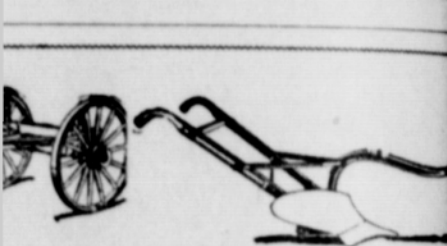

DESIGNATION MAY BE GRANTED FROM BROWNWOOD HERE

Topping From Brownwood Lake to Cross Plains Is Asked By The 2 Cities

The Texas Highway Commission still is studying the request recently made by a Brown county delegation for designation and construction of highway 279 from 14.2 miles north of Brownwood to Cross Plains, according to a letter received from State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer by Mayor Wendell Hayes, County Judge A. E. Nabors and Chamber of Commerce Manager Gene Mattox of Brownwood.

The letter is as follows: "At the June 9th meeting of the Commission you appeared with others in the interest of the designation, construction of surfacing and state maintenance of the extension of highway 279 from a point near Lake Brownwood to Cross Plains.

"During the interim the Highway Commission, with the aid and counsel of the Attorney General's Office, has been endeavoring to set up a statewide policy on future designations such as you request. While such process is slow and tedious, it is moving forward and we hope for a solution in the not too distant future.

"This letter is written to assure you that your request is receiving every consideration and you may expect to hear something further as soon as a definite policy has been established.
