## CROSS PLAINS ASKED FOR \$1,200

### 2,183 Register Here For War Ration Book 4

#### THOSE WHO FAILED TO SIGN-UP MUST SEE RATION BOARD

#### Reminded To Guard Against Loss Of Book For It Is Hard To Secure Another

2,183 persons signed for war ration book four in Cross Plains last week end. Registration was held in the high school building with teachers handling duties of the undertaking.

Superintendent A. J. McCuin pointed out that the number was less than had been anticipated, however, he explained this by pointing out that many persons were not aware of the fact that the registration was necessary. Scores have been coming to the school building to sign-up this week, however, it is now necessary for those who failed to register to make their application to the Callahan County War Ration Board.

Mr. McCuin reminds that householders should guard against loss of any of the books, either the number three which is yet in use, or the number four. They are extremely difficult to get, due to the "red tape" necessary in proving loss and making second application. In many cases it takes 60 days to replace the book.

Persons who failed to register, however, and still have their war ration book three may secure book four in only a few days by filling in the proper papers and presenting them to the county board.

#### Flocks Should Be Culled Edmondson Advises The Raiser

"One of the surest ways poultry producers can make the best use of available feed supplies is to cull all non-layers and low producers from their flocks", says O. B. Edmondson, local vocational agriculture teacher.

"With feed supplies short, rigid culling of the flocks is more important than ever before", he said. "By removing the low producing and unprofitable birds, the owner will have relatively more feed for the higher producing hens and in this way can get more eggs from his feed supply."

To get rid of poor layers, first remove all birds that are sick or otherwise unsound. A crippled or weak hen will not lay, and eventually will come down with disease. It is important, therefore, to remove birds that are sick or lame, decidedly undersized or overweight or that have deformities or weakness of their backs, legs, breast or wings.

Good culling also calls for rearing all mature hens that are yellow-legged and fat. Vigorous birds with red combs and wattles, beached beak and legs, and a thin, pliable abdomen, wide flexible pelvic bones, are usually in production.

**HOMEMAKING HINTS**  
BY THE COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGT.

"The quickest way to a man's heart is through his stomach", so girls it is time to get busy and can a fruit cake for the boy friend overseas. Of course, the deadline has already passed for the soldiers, but we still have until November first to take care of the Navy," stated Miss Dorothy Wilkerson, Callahan county home demonstration agent, who tells how it is done.

**Fruit Cake and Puddings**  
Use any good recipe for making fruit cake. After the ingredients have been mixed well, the batter should be packed into greased cans. Leave three-fourths to one inch headspace top of the can and seal the first roll on can. To steam in pressure cooker leave petcock open, or if using water bath, do not have so much water that it will boil into the cans. Cover water bath with a lid. Let steam 75 minutes for No. 2 cans, 90 for No. 1 cans. Complete seal and process immediately 10 pounds for thirty minutes. For canning plum pudding prepare in the cans the same as fruit cake. Process 10 pound pressure for 15 minutes.

Explains Payment

Payments To Be Made Each Month Upon Submission Of Facts By Producers

Rates of payments which will be made to Callahan county farmers and dairymen delivering whole milk and butterfat, to offset increases in dairy feed costs since September 1942, were recently announced according to information received by the county AAA office according to Sam A. Billingsley, Administrative Officer for AAA.

Payments will be made at the rate of fifty cents a hundredweight for whole milk and six cents a pound on butterfat. Payments on sales of butterfat will be eighty percent of the rate for butterfat.

Payment will be made by draft direct to the producer by the county AAA committee for the county in which the producer's farm is located upon the submission of satisfactory evidence of the quantity of milk or butterfat sold, according to Billingsley. For dairy producers selling whole milk to cooperative associations, milk distributors etc.; the statement normally furnished the producer will constitute satisfactory evidence, provided it shows the quantity of whole milk delivered. The receipts furnished by creameries for butterfat will be accepted as satisfactory evidence under the plan outlined by the AAA administrator. Producers who retail milk will need to substantiate their claims by submission of customers lists, number of cows and amount of feed bought. Producers who sell butter to consumers, local stores, etc., will need to obtain receipts from the buyers.

Payments for October will be made early in November and payments for November and December will be made early in January according to Billingsley. The War Food Administration has announced that the program will be in effect for October, November and December.
