BOND QUOTA OVER SUBSCRIBED WITH \$3,000 TO SPARE

Chairman Thanks People Of All Communities For Aid In Making Drive Successful

The quota of \$342,100.00 which many people said Callahan county could not possibly raise in the third war loan drive has been over-subscribed. Reports not yet final reveal that the goal was topped by more than \$3,000.00.

Coleman Defeats Cross Plains By 13 To 6 Here Friday

Cross Plains high school Buffaloes were defeated 13 to six by Coleman here Friday night in the first conference game of the season for both teams.

The visitors scored in the first period on a beautifully executed play with George Allen Smith racing 40 yards to cross the double stripe. Smith then converted from placement to putting the Bluecats out in front seven to nothing.

The remainder of the first half was uneventful from a scoring standpoint, but the Cross Plains lads came back strong in the 3rd period and pushed over a counter on a 25 yard pass from Ray Plumlee to Etzel Henson, who took the catch on a high gallop and ran 19 more yards to pay dirt. The attempt to add the extra point by passing was nullified when Plumlee's toss fell inches ahead of the reaching arms of Johnny Gay (and the score stood seven to six).

Both teams unworked everything in their repertoire of plays in a desperate effort to score again. Cross Plains nearly made it on a pass from Gay to Plumlee who really showed the Bluecats some hip weaving and fancy side stepping after taking the pass and sprinting 20 yards more. Plumlee's interference bogged down in front of him after all but one defender had been removed from the path.

Smith, of Coleman, repeated his first period performance and registered another of those beautiful 40 yard sprints, however, he was dropped two yards short of a touchdown. On the following play, however, he stepped through a hole in his line for the necessary yardage and a touchdown. The attempt to placekick the point was wild and the score stood Coleman 13, Cross Plains six.

Despite the fact they were defeated, local fans agreed that the thundering herd had played a brilliant game and gave a favorable account of itself in the face of a much heavier and more experienced team.

Smith for Coleman, and Plumlee, for Cross Plains, were by far the most spectacular performers for the evening. Each displayed form that should make them strong contenders for all district honors when mythical teams are named at the end of the season.

Cross Plains had a net gain rushing of 48 yards while in this department Coleman had 197 yards. Cross Plains made four first downs as compared with nine for the visitors. Cross Plains tried 15 passes, connecting on four for 95 yards. Coleman attempted eight passes hitting twice for a total of 22 yards. Each team was penalized three times for a total of 25 yards.

The squad is reported to be large, experienced and determined to break into the victory column. A rough and ready conflict is promised.

Coach Raymond Smoot's Buffaloes came through their six to 13 loss to Coleman Friday night in good shape and the entire roster is expected to be ready for the opening whistle Friday night. There will likely be few, if any changes in the line up from the combination which took the field against Coleman.

Starter for Clyde will likely be: Leon Freeman and William Tenford at ends, Eddie Dunn and Jack Wilhelm at tackles, Connard Estes and Harlan Raley at guards, Collis Green at center, and Thurman Anderson, Bobby Gale Norwood, W. T. Cuthbert and Arnold Coumel in the backfield.

THIS AREA PRODUCES EXCELLENT WALNUTS

RECENT RAINS BOON TO CROPS; FARMERS ARE MORE JUBILANT

Precipitations During The Month Of September Are More Than Five Inches

Five and three fourths inches of moisture which fell over the Cross Plains trade territory has greatly enhanced agricultural prospects throughout this section. Farmers are now viewing the future much more jubilantly and yields of cotton, peanuts and sweet potatoes and late feed will be much greater than originally predicted.

During the month of September 5.42 inches of rain fell here. Then on October first another .36 of an inch was recorded by S. F. Bond, who compiles government weather data in Cross Plains.

Virtually all streams in this section ran last week and much stock water was stored in tanks and lakes, many of which were dry or dangerously low. No hauling of stock water was reported from Cross Plains this week for the first time in two months.

The earth is reported to now have a good season and indications are that small grains will afford much winter grazing. Too, winter grasses are beginning to green hurriedly greatly improving general range conditions and will likely result in large savings of feeds.

Local Men With 36th Division In Italy Believed OK

Fear that many Cross Plains men with the 36th Division which is reported to have seen action in Italy, might have been among the casualties this week when Mrs. John Ford received word from her son, Sgt. Junior Ford, stating "All the boys are okeh". The message was interpreted to mean that all the boys from this place came through without serious injury.

Much apprehension has been felt by local people for the past couple of weeks for the well being of the men from this territory with the 36th, for it was reported that casualties were high, and the 36th is believed to have been in the thick of the fight.

CALLAHAN COUNTY H. D. AGENT GIVES TIPS ON FALL CLOTHES

Key words to describe new clothes for the Fall and Winter are "sleek, wearable, durable, and versatile," in the opinion of those who have been studying clothing styles for a long time.

For the duration, women can still be well dressed in simple clothing, but they needn't expect any extra frills, says Dorothy Wilkerson, Callahan County Home Demonstration Agent. There are other changes to be expected besides reducing the amount of material in a dress.

Fabrics will be lighter in weight and less tightly woven. For instance, percale and other cottons which weigh four ounces to the yard with a thread count of 80 in the warp and 80 in the filling no longer are available for civilian use. These materials which are especially suitable for children's play clothes and house dresses now are being used by the armed forces. Cottons are gone for the duration, and so are reversible, lined and quilted skirts.

New clothes also are showing military trends as well as the influence of the United Nations in their design and decoration. The straight-cut jackets and pencil-slit skirts come from China, while trim, well-tailored suits show a British influence.

Coat dresses or button-down-front styles are favorites again this season, and "boat necks" are back again. So are high round necks, which provide a good background for costume jewelry. Because they save quantities of materials, short length evening dresses will be worn a great deal.

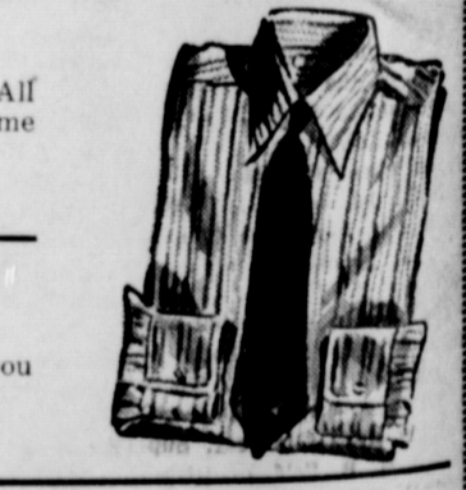
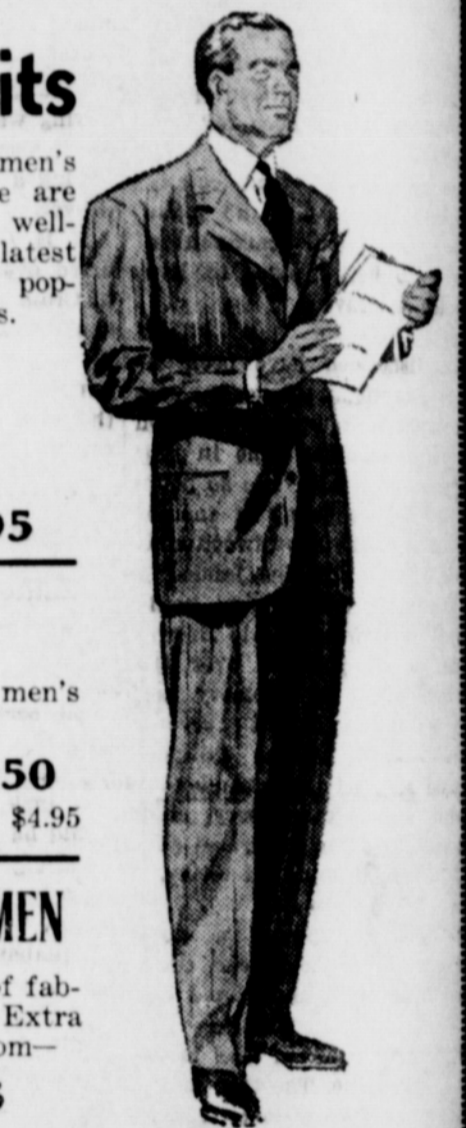
