It seems evident from this that only if the Board does its job with the greatest efficiency can we expect to see further restrictions, and very hard restrictions, avoided."

Nordyke Has 20 Days From January First To Make Known His Intentions.

At the general election held in ovember, 1942, Mr. C. R. Nordyke was re-elected Sheriff of Callahan County. Thereafter, on the 12th day of November, 1942, Mr. Nordyke informed the County Judge that he wished to tender his resignation ember 1, 1942. Notice was given to November 16, 1942, the Commissioners Court met, at which time Mr. Nordyke tendered his format resignation to become effective as

above stated. The resignation was accepted at that time, and, in keeping with the Constitution and the Statutes, the court proceeded to appoint another sheriff to take the place of Mr. Nordyke for his un-expired term, and Mr. B. O. Brame received such appointment. In taking such action, the court was acting under authority of Artille 5, section 23, of the Constitution, which provides as

"There shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county a sheriff, who shall hold his office for the term of two years, whose duties, and perquisites, and fees of office, shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and vacancies in whose office shall be filled by the Com-

American fighting men and American civilians taken prisoner and interned by Germany or Italy receive regular American Red Cross standard food parcels and necessary clothing as soon as the International Red Cross Committee at Geneva is notified of their capture and camp location. Prisoners receive a package a week and internees a package

every two weeks. In addition, a prisoner may also receive a supplementary package every sixty days from his family or friends as soon as the Provost Marshall General's office has notified them of his whereabouts. Twenty thousand American Red Cross parcels were sent to the Far East last June on the diplomatic exchange ship, Gripsholm, for distribution to American prisoners.
