Farmers in the Red River country of Oklahoma have adopted a method to rid their cotton of boll weevils. Their experiment, and it is said a very successful one, is to saturate tow sacks with crude oil, attach them to their cultivators and let them drag over the cotton plants as they are cultivated. However, we would advise that too great a quantity of the crude oil be not allowed to come in contact with the plant, as crude oil, if freely applied, is very destructive to any kind of vegetation.



Wilson, one of England's most filus GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP Wilson, one of England's most filustrious soldiers, who was chief of the imperial staff during the final stages of the World War, was assassinated on the doorstep of his residence in No Declaration of Policy is Wanted Eaton Place by two young men who gave the names of James O'Brien and James Connolly.

The assassins had loitered about. waiting an hour for his return from unveiling a memorial to men of the Great Eastern Railway who fell in the war. When he alighted from his motor car, Field Marshal Wilson walked up the steps, and the men fired several shots at him from close range, three of which took effect, one in the chest, one in the leg and the third in the wrist. The Feld Marshal died before he could be taken into the house. His horrified wife heard the shooting and rushed out to find her husband's body, dressed in full uniform, lying in a pool of blood with the sword he had drawn to

#### FIELD MARSHAL WILSON IS SHOT TO DEATH IN LONDON

His Efforts To Restore Order Were Not Welcomed in Southern Ireland.

trious soldiers, who was chief of the imperial staff during the final stages of the World War, was assassinated on the doorstep of his residence in Eaton Place by two young men who gave the names of James O'Brien and James Connolly.

The assassins had loitered about, waiting an hour for his return from unveiling a memorial to men of the Great Eastern Railway who fell in the war. When he alighted from his motor car, Field Marshal Wilson walked up the steps, and the men fired several shots at him from close range, three of which took effect, one in the chest, one in the leg and the third in the wrist. The Feld Marshal died before he could be taken into the house. His horrified wife heard the shooting and rushed out to find her husband's body, dressed in full uniform, lying in a pool of blood with the sword he had drawn to meet his assailants by his side.

Scotland yard made public the names of the slayers, and declared that Connolly had a letter in his possession indicating he was a member of the Irish Republican Army.
