

ARCH WARRANTS MUST BE BASED ON DEFINITE INFOR-MATION-NO HEARSAY.

Dallas.—United States District dge James C. Wilson ruled in court Dallas Thursday that no private me can be searched for liquor on arsay testimony, and that this can done only under search warrants sed upon substantial evidence.

The Judge said that it is a matter the Constitution and Congress at a man has a right to feel sure the sancity of his home and of privacy of his home and of the curity in his home against unlawsearches and seizures of all kinds. According to Judge Wilson's ruling. arch warrants in this district must sworn out on definite evidence. formation must be backed by a orn statement from the informer, first-hand information upon the

### RAILROAD EXPENSES MOTHERS AND ARE CUT \$50,000,000

OVERTIME RULING WILL REOPEN MANY SMALL STATIONS NOW CLOSED OVER COUNTRY

### STATION AGENTS ARE HIT

Abolishes Time and a Half Overtime Ruling Until After Nine Hours'

Chicago. Ill .-- What the railroads declare will amount to an annual saving of \$50,000,000 in normal traffic is lopped off the pay of 300,000 railroad clerks, freight handlers, express and station employes in a decision made public by the United States Railroad Board Sunday, in abrogating certain overtime working agreements and making important changes in others.

The most important changes in the rules are abolition of time-and a half Greenville, Delaware. overtime until nine hours have been worked and the re-establishment of a pre war time rule allowing railroads to employ men on "split trick" in small towns where work is intermittent.

The "split trick" rule will not only save railroads millions of dollars annually, it is stated, but it will also mean the reopening of many small railread stations which have been Compound. They know what it did for closed because of excessive cost of maintaining them under the national war-time agreements. In other words, the decision puts the "milk station" back on the railroad schedule.

The board reached its decision only after lengthy deliberations and the document is featured by the most pro nounced split in opiniion of any decision yet given out. There is a dissenting opinion signed by Samuel Higgins, J. H. Elliott and Horace Baker, railroad members of the board, be cause the majority did not decide upon ten hours before over-time began instead of nine, and an answer to this dissenting opinion, in which the minority is charged with being "obviously in error," is signed by Ben W. Hooper and G. W. W. Hangar, public members, and W. L. McMenimen, labor members. A. O. 

Fact That Is Well Known to Mariners May Be News to Some of Ou. Readers.

As the bell was slightly heavier than the water it remained on the bottom. Then the boy thought of mixing sait with the water, since he knew salt water would float heavier objects than fresh water would. He tried this and was rewarded with the floating ball. This particular fact is demonstrated

at the mouths of rivers. Objects rolling along the bottom of a river, too heavy to come to the top, will rise applies to boats. A ship with a cargo on the sea will sink sometimes a foot or two on entering a fresh water port. If she leaves the port with her cargo, she will rise on entering the ocean. For that reason a ship may be toaded apparently too heavily at a pier and still be all right on the waves,

In building a dam, the fact of salt water's being heavier than fresh must be remembered.—Kannas City Star-
