

> The United Fidelity Insurance company of Dallas has been granted a license to do business by the department of insurance and banking. The company has a capital stock \$500,000 and proposes to write life, health and accident insurance.

Dr. Oscar Davis, state health officer, announces the addition of Miss Helen Donaldson to the staff of public health nurses of the bureau of child hygiene. Miss Donaldson will serve in the capacity of state advisory nurse in southwest Texas, with headquarters at Houston.

Plans for effecting a reduction in the freight rates on road building materials in Texas were left to a joint committee of eight after the railroads said the carriers felt it their legal duty to contest any order or reduction, which might be made by the Texas commission.




