The Litzinger, Gooch No. 1, is being put on the pump, with an estimated production from 75 to 150 barrels. Eighty-three barrels were swabbed from the well in one day, and it is claimed that more oil can be got with a pump.

Local parties have been discussing the proposition of organizing in a small way for making shallow tests in the Cross Plains country. One party has been investigating the cost of rigs, tools, casing, etc. Geological reports indicate shallow oil in various parts of the country. The test would be worth a good deal to us in letting us know what we have. If we get good production, we would be put on the map.

BODY OF PVT. TOM PEEVY ARRIVES FROM OVERSEAS

The remains of Private W. A. J. (Tom) Peevy were laid to rest in the family cemetery in Cottonwood on Thursday afternoon, October 21, 1920, with military honors, the services being conducted by the Rev. R. D. Carter and the Baird Post of the American Legion, and the ex-service men of Cross Plains and Cottonwood, about 75 in all, with probably the biggest crowd present that ever attended a funeral in this county. Judge B. L. Russell of Baird made a few remarks in which he took occasion to give the boys who died of diseases as much credit as those who fell in action. The body of the deceased has been expected to arrive for several days, keeping the family in great suspense. It reached Cross Plains on Tuesday afternoon, accompanied by Corporal Simmons of Camp Pike, Ark., who returned to his post on Friday morning. Mr. Peevy enlisted in service in 1918 and sailed for Europe in the fall, being sick when he reached Scotland. He died on the 8th of October that year from pneumonia. Being unconscious when he was taken off the transport, his next-of-kin could not be ascertained, and it was some time before his folks knew his fate. The Red Cross interested itself in the matter and notified the deceased father, W. O. Peevy, of his death and his burial place, giving as many of the details as possible, that are always treasured by those dear to one. To comply with the father's wishes, the body was removed from the military cemetery in Craigton, Glasgow Scotland, and shipped to this place to be laid at rest in the family cemetery where it can be cared for by loving hands. He was born on July 22, 1895, in Callahan County, being at his death 28 years, two months and sixteen days old.

The casket was looked into by members of the family and others closely associated with the deceased, the remains being identified beyond a doubt as being the body of Tom Peevy. Those surviving are his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Peevy, than whom, according to all reports, there was never a more faithful and loving step-mother, Will Peevy of Cross Plains, Turner, Dee, Sublett, and Elmer Peevy of Cottonwood, an uncle, Frank Peevy, and an aunt, Mrs. Boss Ivy.

TO FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS

"In order to control the disease," said D. E. Breed, executive secretary of the Texas Public Health Association, "the anti-tuberculosis agencies of this country are advocating three definite policies: First, the prevention of infection, especially from adults to children; second, the building of bodily resistance; and third, the cure and restoration of the curable to working efficiency. To carry out these policies we must discover the cases by means of tuberculosis nurses, dispensaries, clinics, private physicians and general education. Then we must work for hospitals and sanatoria to care for the cases. These things our Association and local societies are advocating, to stamp out tuberculosis in Texas."

The leading citizens of Coleman have signed a petition calling on the public and the land owners to protect all quail this season. The birds are too valuable to be killed. We all should organize to protect this insect-eating bird.

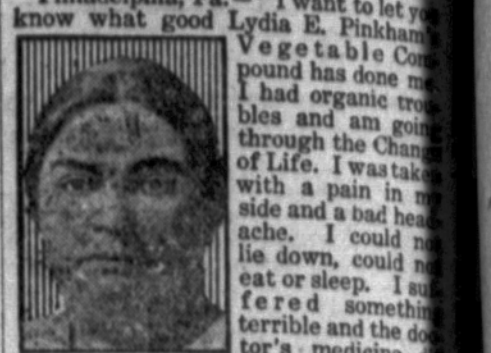

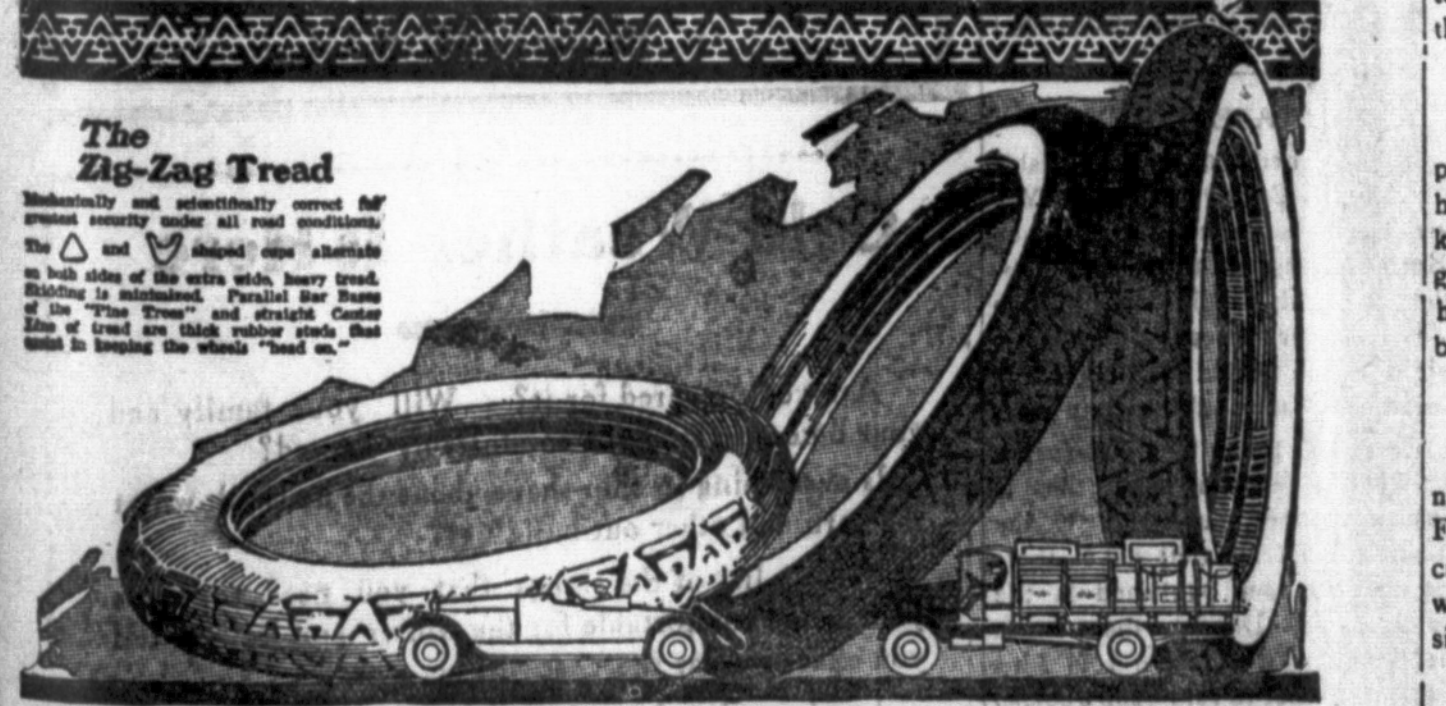
