## ANOTHER WELL TO BE DRILLED IN THE CROSS PLAINS TERRITORY

### RETAIL MERCHANTS ASSOCIATION MEETING

The Retail Merchants Association held their regular meeting on Thursday night, January, 20th. Many things for the benefit and general welfare of Cross Plains and the surrounding territory were brought up and discussed. This association has been organized not only for the benefit that will be received by the membership, but to help every man, woman and child in the Cross Plains trade territory. If you are a good citizen, put your shoulder to the wheel and help the arrangement committee to plan and carry out a successful Cross Plains boosting campaign in the Hillburn and other surrounding trade territories. If you own property in the town of Cross Plains, you certainly should boost this association. If you do not own property here it is a good time to buy some lots and build you a home. Cross Plains needs at least ten new tenant houses. We have kept not less than six families from locating in our town during the past three months on account of this shortage in houses. If we had been able to accommodate these people, the town would at present be enjoying an increase in population of not less than twenty-five or thirty people.

Mr. Larkin, representative of the Roxana Pet. Co., was in town the latter part of last week. While here he called a meeting of the property owners of the noted Roxana Block southwest of town. He assured the parties that the company was preparing to start operations for a deep test on some lease in the block, within 90 days. Several people versed in the oil business seem to think that this will be the opening up of quite an extensive development campaign for the Cross Plains, trade territory.

We have also been informed that certain parties who live in Chicago, were here during the past week trying to secure certain acreage for one or more test wells. Every one in Cross Plains and vicinity should be deeply interested in the development of this territory.
