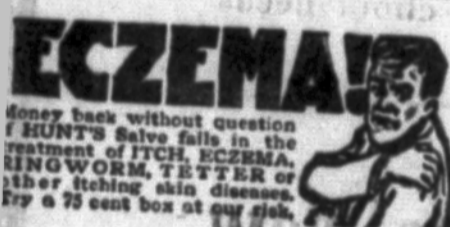

Sales Day.

Prof. B. C. Chrisman of Putnam, nominee for School Superintendent has been appointed assistant superintendent to Mr. Settle who goes to Cross Plains superintendent of the schools there. Mr. Chrisman has moved to Baird and bought him a home, the Lige Burnam place in the north-east part of town.

CROSS PLAINS SCHOOL BEGINS NEXT MONDAY

The 1920-'21 session of the Public School will open September the twentieth and will continue for eight or nine months. The school is on the "State Aid" list of approved schools, the State having granted \$500 to it last session, with the understanding, or agreement, that the School Board purchase the same amount of equipment, etc. This has been done, and within two weeks we hope to receive complete libraries for all of the lower grades and some additional books for the high school, and as much of the other State Aid Equipment as the funds set aside for this purpose would buy. I believe the high school reference library ranks first in the county.

THE FREE TEXT-BOOK LAW requires that pupils bring their book-cards of last year and present them for inspection before books for this year are issued. If this is done, it will greatly help us teachers in handling the text-book business. Pupils, please bring your cards Monday. Relating to text-books also, permit me to say that all will have been fumigated and disinfected as required by law.

HILBURN FIELD BRINGING IN MANY NEW OIL WELLS

Shook No. 4, 1/2 mile northwest of Hilburn No. 1, shot on Wednesday, initial production of 500 barrels.

Shook No. 1 raising casing to shoot.

Invincible, on Shook, rigging up on two other locations.

Bush No. 1 producing 500 barrels thru bad bidge. Well was shot with 600 quarts nitro glycerine, which is giving much trouble.

M. L. Shook No. 2 and 3, holding up to first production, cleaning out bridges and flowing through the same.

The W. C. Hilburn No. 1, brought in in January, seven and one-half miles northeast of Cross Plains, making 250 barrels.

W. C. Hilburn No. 2, the second producer in the field, is making 1500 barrels.

Humble Clark, No. 1, 1/2 mile southeast of the Hilburn No. 1, is holding up its initial production of 1600 barrels. Showing lots of gas.

Hoffman-Hitt No. 1 increasing flow as it is cleaned out.

Sipe-Star-Hitt resumed drilling. Taylor, three miles west of Rising Star, one mile north of the Woodruff, spudded in.

H. L. Vestal, drilling at 1725 waiting on underreamer. Had a showing of oil at this depth.

Consolidated C. E. Barr, 3,050 feet, preparing to shoot; is at Hilburn depth.

Consolidated Vestal No. 1, two miles northeast of Cross Plains, on pump, producing fifty barrels.

Greenlee Harris No. 1, shut down at 1775, on account of losing bit in hole.

L. P. Litzinger et al, J. N. Gooch near Pioneer, is underreaming a 2100, after waiting 5 days last week on underreamer lugs and prior to that the drillers had to wait a week on a crank shaft.

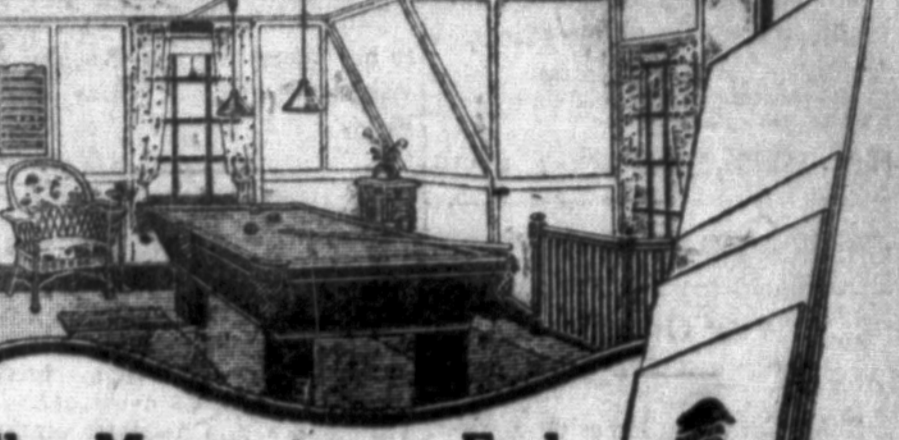
CROSS PLAINS GETS ANOTHER MODERN CONVENIENCE

Messrs. M. E. Wakefield and C. C. Neeb are figuring on a franchise from the city to lay pipe lines for furnishing gas to the town. Mr. Wakefield states that their idea at present is to give the proposition a try out and that they will lay the pipe on top of the ground and will serve only the main streets of the town, and if the gas holds up and the business promises to pay any revenue they can enlarge the system later. The first pipe to be laid will extend from the Cross Plains Gin, where gas is now being served for fuel from the Pennant well, up 9th Street to W. R. Wagner's home; thence south with Avenue E to 8th street; thence east to Avenue C, and thence north to C. S. Boyles' home. By running laterals thru the alleys, all the business houses and many residences will be served. They will also run a short line from Uncle Jim Coffman's home, where the gas was first brought, and to W. A. McGowens and other homes in that part of town.

Mr. Wakefield states that he is doing this as much to give Cross Plains gas service as anything else. The town now has electric lights, and when gas is served no town in this section of the country will be ahead of it for conveniences, size considered.

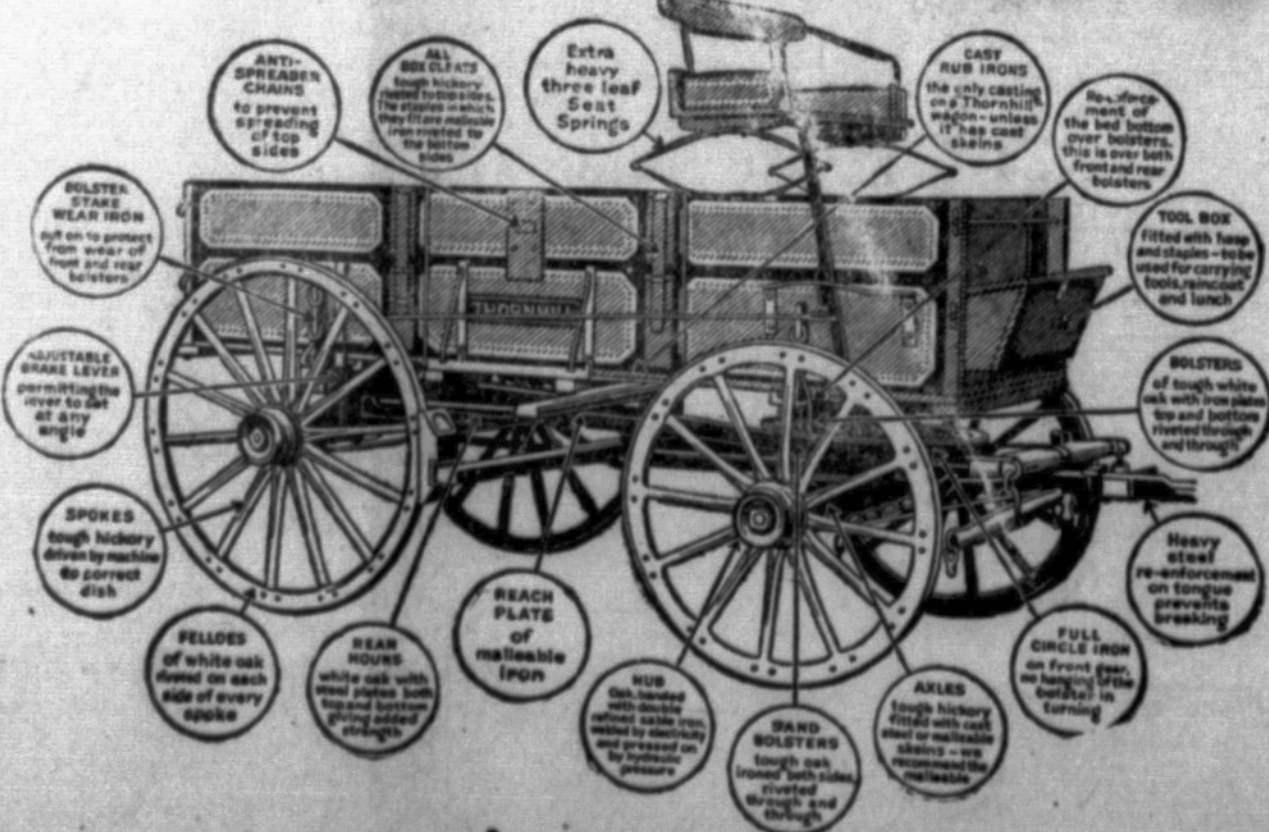

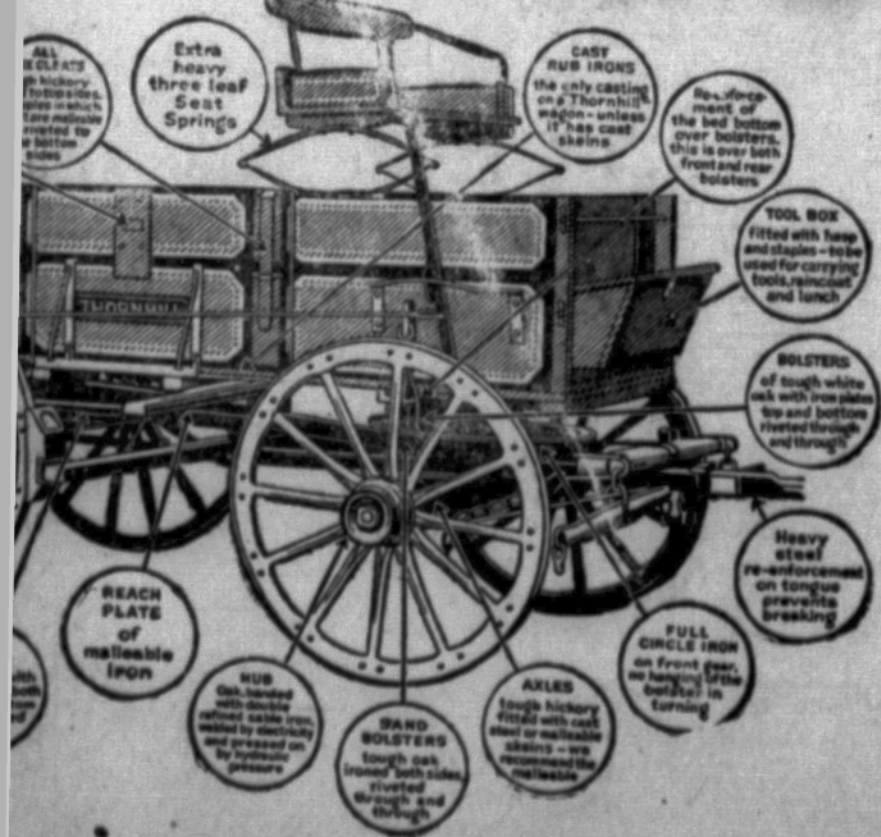

STATE PRESS ON ADVERTISING

The old-fashioned grocer who sat on a splint bottom chair and discussed the flies—the more intimate and immediate flies—with a hardused handkerchief, is dead. He couldn't stand the pace. He passed hence peacefully, convinced as he was that his new competitors, with their swept and garnished stores and their newspaper advertisements, would fail. The old-fashioned grocer believed in democracy and personal liberty. He spat on the floor himself and believed in the right of others to do the same thing. He permitted dogs in his place of business because he regarded dogs as entitled to go where their masters went. He did not keep his stock of goods carefully under cover, because that would have involved extra labor. And he did not contend victoriously with the flies, inasmuch as flies were coeval with man, inasmuch as flies had been endured from the foundation of the world, inasmuch as there were so many flies there was no use in worrying over a few of them. In many respects the old-fashioned grocer was a lovable, generous and hardy character. He loved his business, not so much on account of the profit he was supposed to make out of it, but more because it afforded him opportunity for social exchange and many chances to eat between meals. He was always willing to give a bit of candy to the child of a good customer, because he didn't have so many good customers that he couldn't afford to contribute a penny's worth of candy toward cementing profitable relations with one. In sum, the old-fashioned grocer filled a necessary office in old-fashioned communities, and he would have died happy could he have been entirely assured that the advertising stores were destined to fail.—State Press.

FROM THE DAYS OF CHIVALRY

Tavern Signs When First Instituted in England Had a Purely Heraldic Significance.

"Cherry Tree Inn," "The Sign of the Spread Eagle"—how many of these typical old tavern names pop into view as one motors through the country! Even on the latest examples of those oases in the desert, the modern inns and roadhouses, the old-fashioned trade-marks abound: flora and fauna are still represented.

Our taverns in the early days were inspired, like most other things a that time, by the English ones. And tavern signs in England go back for their origin to the days of chivalry, whence they have a purely heraldic significance.

In medieval times the servants and retainers of a nobleman were expected to wear on their sleeves his coat of arms and tradesmen who were established on his lands to display them over their shops. This explains such apparently inconsistent signs as a fleur-de-lis over an Irish tavern or the Dove of Peace on a rowdy hostelry.—Exchange.

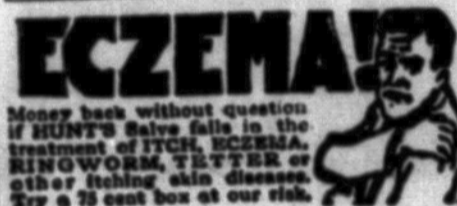
