Corn-Hog Program

The Corn-Hog program is ready for launching in Callahan county and it is hoped that all of our farmers it is hoped that all of our farmers who have been growing surplus stock will avail themselves off this oppor-tunity to reduce their surplus stock and receive a government renumeration in the sum of \$5.00 per head or 75 per cent of the two year average, 1932-3. December 1, 1933 to Noveember 30, 1934 will be the year known as 1934. For example: If a man has 40 hogs average for 1932-33 he shall reduce 10 hogs and he will receive \$5.00 per head on 30 hogs, which is equivalent to \$15.00 per hog for the 25 per cent he reduced.

The government will spend three indred and fifty million dollars in hundred and fifty million dollars in this corn-hog program. Likewise, those who have a surplus of corn may reduce on a three year average, 20 per cent of their acreage, and the government will pay 30 cents per bushel for the year average production for the land taken out of production.

now, but we can show our love for him in many other ways at Christmas. By being thoughtful and kind, by making others happy, by remembering those who are in need." Mrs. Marsdale





At Christmas Time

Raymond S. Mauk, state fire insurance commissioner, has sounded a warning of the danger of fires during the Christmas Holidays. His statement follows.

"It is not intended to suggest that the Christmas celebration be transformed into a safety campaign. However, the suggestions that are made here for preventing fires are simple and sensible and there is no adopted. The pleasure of the holiday

"When setting up the Christman tree, it should be placed at a safe distance from any stove, fireplace, or other heating device.

"Candles have long been associated with Christmas celebrations, but they are altogether too dangerous to be used as tree decorations, or for win dow displays on Christmas Eve, no matter what precautions may be taken. For tree lights we recommend strings of miniature electric lamps

"The artificial decorations used on the tree and about the rooms should easily as can those made of paper, officials. eotton, pyroxylin plastic (celluloid) or other highly combustible substances

"Toy electric trains, motors and other appliances should not be attached to light sockets until all fuses and connections are in perfect order.

"Pennies or wire should never be used in replacing blown out electric fuses. The fuse is the safety valve on your wiring system to protect you against fire.

ECORATING the home has be-卫 come almost as important a part of the Christmas celebration as decorating the table, and making the Christmas table attractive is essential as having the turkey properly seasoned and the plum pud-ding piping hot. Certainly, the tra-ditional use of holly and mistletoe is as acceptable as ever; but many new and unusual treatments have been developed for those who crave some thing a little different, a little gay and festive, especially for this year of all years.

Of course, the Christmas tree itself belongs to the children and should be decorated to suit them with all the gay little ornaments so dear to their hearts. During recent years, many people have used only one color on the tree, such as blue or silver. This year a red, white and blue scheme might be tried, with one layer of blue glass balls, one of red and one of white or silver-and so on, up the tree. An added bit of joy might be provided by appliquing a two dimensional Santa Claus on a sheet, which would be suspended on a wall beside the tree. Lack of technical skill in the execution will make this feature even more amusing.

In many homes, the tree is placed in nursery or upstairs sitting rooms and for these, a tree of different type might be used for the living room deeoration. Flat trees, made of such materials as plywood, sheet metals or folded cellophane, might be placed on the mantel shelf or against a bare wall space; while real trees, in miniature sizes, are attractive on either side of the freplace or at the entrance door to the room. The artificial trees could be in any color to match some decorative note of the room and might be trimmed with white cords or tassels, ropes of tinsel or painted pine cones, as well as the more usual but always lovely glass balls. An airy fairy type of tree might be constructby pasting feathers on a cardboard

tree; while nothing could be loveller than a tiny evergreen, hung with real flowers, particularly some flowers of white,

IS to place candies in the wan brackets and have the entire room beautifully candle-lit.

More pretentious schemes provide for the decoration of the walls themselves. Swags of leaves may be suspended from the picture moulding, draped up at intervals with glass balls, mistletoe or poinsettias, the leaves being green on white walls and silver, gold or white against various colored backgrounds. If preferred, the reverse scheme, with swags of colored balls caught up with sprigs of holly or pine cones might be developed. Windows, too, may be given a festive air by swags of red or green cords or rib bons, entwined with painted berries; or if the drapes do not permit of extra decoration, wreaths made of the glass ornaments, silver leaves or tinsel and poinsettias combined, may be hung from the tassel or cords.

The center of interest in the dining room is the table and a host of new ideas are available in preparing for the Christmas feast. For the children's table, a tiny Christmas tree might be hung with strings of popcorn or cakes baked in interesting designs. Tiny gifts, placed around the table, might be attached to the tree with red and green ribbons. For the elders, the basis of the scheme might be a tablecloth of tarleton or doilles of ollcloth, decorated with figures painted on or cut from gift paper. Painted pine cones could be used for place cards or candle holders and centerpiece might be a bowl or glass ball or a cornucopia of fruits, surrounded by poinsettias, holly leaves or gilded nuts and berries.






