STOCKHOLDERS IN HOME REFINERY LOOSE SUIT

(Gorman Progress)

One of the most interesting suits in the history of Eastland county was the one filed by the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co., of Gorman against the stockholders of the Gorman Home Refinery. They filed the suit early in the spring alleging that the institution was a partnership and not a joint stock association. A real legal battle has been on since that time and on last Friday the last effort at delay on the part of the defendants was done away with. The case was called for trial and the taking of the testimony was begun. The suit had been filed against eighty-three of the stockholders and they were all represented in the case. Some score of attorneys were in the case and on a proposition to pay off the attorney for the bank, Judge Sam R. Scott. Their offer was conditioned on suit being filed against the remainder of the stockholders. This will be done and the cases will come up for trial in the November term of court.

There is all told about fifteen hundred stockholders in the state and all of them are to be cited for the November term of court.

There have been several far reaching decisions on this phase of the trust and joint stock companies in the last year and in each instance the stockholders have lost out. This is a severe blow to the people who invested in them in the boom days and will mean many a hardship on many of them.

CALLAHAN COUNTY BAPTISTS TO CONVENE AT ATWELL

A committee of the Callahan County Baptist Association has issued a general invitation to Baptists to meet with Atwell Church on Thursday night, Oct. 29, where the Association will convene, preliminary to the big Fifth Sunday Meeting. LOCAL MARKET MAY EXCEED 3,000 BALES

Wednesday night of this week there had been 2,036 bales of this season's crop brought in and sold on the Cross Plains market. It is selling at an average price this week of about 19c. It is now believed by local buyers that the number of bales marketed here this season will exceed 3,000.

A reduction of 440,000 bales during September in prospective cotton production this year was shown in the Government forecast issued Oct. 3, placing the crop at 10,135,000 bales.

SHERIFF SAM NOLLEY ARRESTED ON ADULTRY CHARGE

Charging adultery, warrants for arrest of Sheriff Sam Nolley of Eastland county, and Mrs. J. S. Sparks were sworn to at the district attorney's office at Fort Worth Tuesday morning of last week. Bonds of \$300 each were made. The complaints were signed by B. F. Griffith, emergency officer at police headquarters and followed the arrest, it is said, of Nolley and the woman at a hotel Wednesday night 10 o'clock. It is said they had registered under assumed names. The arrests were made by Acting Capt. Ed Lindsey and Detective Ed Oung. It was said at police headquarters that the sheriff and the woman were allowed the privilege of staying the remainder of the night in the office of the chief of detectives rather than be locked in jail, as happens to the majority of prisongers. Nolley a few months ago was

charged with an attack on an ex-soldier at Cisco, and only a few days ago a mass meeting at Eastland demanded that he resign his office. I also demanded that the county attorney resign. As far as known the sheriff has taken no action on the request.

At the time of their arrests both the sheriff and the woman gave their homes as Amarillo, according to officers, and Nolley registered as John Jones. Later the name was changed on the police blotter.

MRS. J. T. RIGGS DIED AT BURNT BRANCH

Just before going to press the Review learns that Mrs. J. T. Riggs, wife of "Uncle Jimmie" Riggs, died at their home in the Burnt Branch community Thursday morning at 5:15. Mrs. Riggs was 67 years of age and one of the pioneer citizens of that community. Her body was laid to rest in the Burnt Branch cemetery Thursday evening.

After several weeks of comparative complete shut down reports coming from Pioneer indicate an immediate resumption of much new work in that district lying from 4 to 6 miles east of Cross Plains. McCamey, et al, are reported to have spudded in on two new wells within the past week and have three more locations which will be drilling within the next week or ten days, and will give this company a total of five "strings" running again at the same time; while the States Co., as well as the Gulf Co. and several others are planning to start from one to three wells each. This is taken as an indication that the worst of the oil slump is believed by the operators to have passed and that from now on business will slowly return to normal in the local fields. East of town the Pennant Co., on their No. 2, on the old Albin lease, have abandoned their shallow gas discovery at 1575 feet and will drill on down to the regular 2460 to 2485 foot pay. This expected when the gas was first discovered to save the well at that depth but it later proved to have been drilled too far in and begun showing some water and as gas is now very plentiful in that district a later decision brought the change in program and the well is now drilling at a little below 1700 feet. This well offsets Moore's-Acker producer and is being watched with much interest, being on the west extension to the Pioneer field and is about two and half miles south east of Cross Plains. Crabb, et al, are reported to have abandoned their deep test on the Star, though there is some talk of giving it a shot as a splendid showing was passed at 2900 feet, which is the same pay strata as the old Pennant gasser that has a record of over two years continuous production of gas with a limited quantity of oil, and is only a short distance away. Crabb et al, Elsberry No. 1, in the same district, is drilling at a little below 300 feet. The outcome of this well will be closely watched as it is located almost squarely between the shallow producer of Gillette & Magness at Cross Cut, and the Star lease where tremendous gas was discovered in the same shallow structure, and the Elsberry No. 1, will go far toward proving the extent of the oil bearing part of this shallow pay. Several new locations are now being made in the Cross Cut district but lack of water is greatly hindering developments in that immediate vicinity and the Junior Oil Co., Byrd No. 1, is still shut down for this reason. Lamb & Kirkpatrick's well about 3 miles south of Cross Cut is again drilling at 2375 feet, having passed up a good showing at around 2200 foot level but decided to go on to 3000 feet, and if a better pay is not discovered may come back and develop this 2200 foot strata with a test shot.

A good deal of credit is due two boys of this age to tackle a job so dangerous as the killing of a snake which was by every evidence as old as they were, and very dangerous.

LESSON FOR OCTOBER 8

THE BIRTH AND CHILDHOOD OF JESUS

LESSON TEXT—Luke 2:1-20. GOLDEN TEXT—And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man.—Luke 2:52. REFERENCE MATERIAL—Matt. 1:18; 2:23.

PRIMARY TOPIC—The Boy Jesus. JUNIOR TOPIC—The Boyhood of Jesus. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Jesus at Home and at School. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Religious Training of the Young.

I. The Birth of Jesus (vv. 1-7). 1. Time of (vv. 1-3). It was at a time when the Jews were coming under the Roman power. It was a most propitious time for the introduction of the gospel. The whole world was under one rule, making it possible for ministers to go from place to place easily and without molestation.

2. Place of (vv. 4-6). Bethlehem, the prophet had foretold 700 years before (Micah 5:2). God moved the emperor to enforce the decree of taxation in time to cause Mary to be at Bethlehem.

3. Circumstances of (vv. 7). His surroundings were of the most humble sort. The Almighty Creator condescended to take upon himself humanity—to be born in a manger, becoming the poorest of the poor that none might be hindered from coming to Him.

II. The Birth of Jesus Announced (vv. 8-20). 1. To Whom (vv. 8, 9). The shepherds who were watching over their flocks by night. The glorious gospel message was first given to laboring men.

2. By Whom (vv. 9). The first gospel sermon was preached by the angel of the Lord. The angels have part in making known the gospel to lost men. These glorious beings do not deeply sympathize with fallen, sin-cursed men.

3. The Nature of the Message (vv. 10-14). It was good tidings of great joy. It was good tidings because the way of salvation was about to be opened for all—Jew and Gentile. So glorious was this news that a multitude of the heavenly host accompanied it with a song of praise. It is through Jesus Christ that God's kindness and good will are made known to man.

4. The Shepherds Witnessing (vv. 15-20). They made a prompt investigation of the angel's message.

III. The Child Jesus Growing (vv. 40-52). Jesus Christ was divine, but His deity did not interfere with His development as a human being. The processes of His physical, mental and spiritual growth were the same as those of any normal human being.

1. Jesus Tarrying Behind at Jerusalem (vv. 40-43). At the age of twelve years a Jewish child took His place as a worshiper in the temple, for he was considered a "child of the law." Being conscious of His mission when His mother and Joseph were returning from attendance at the Passover, Jesus tarried behind to enter the temple and inquire into the meaning of the ordinances of God's house.

2. Jesus Found in the Temple (vv. 44-47). When His mother and Joseph had gone some distance on their journey they perceived that Jesus was missing and sought for Him among their kinsfolk and acquaintances. Not finding Him there they returned to Jerusalem, where they found Him in the temple. (1) He was "sitting" (v. 46), showing that He was no passing visitor or sightseer. He was perfectly at home in His Father's house. (2) He was "hearing" (v. 46). He was hearing the teachers of God's Word. This shows that He was eager to learn God's will. (3) He asked questions (v. 46). His growing mind was inquisitive. It more than received what was taught; it inquired after. (4) He answered questions (v. 47). His answers showed great wisdom, such as to astonish those who heard Him. Yet we should not surmise that He was consciously displaying His wisdom. It was not an exhibition of His divine wisdom, but the expression of the workings of a perfect human mind suffused by the Holy Spirit.

3. Mary's Complaint (vv. 48-50). She reproached with Him for His behavior. To this He replied in a dignified, yet tender manner. He made no apology, showing that He was more than the son of Mary.

4. Jesus' Obedience (v. 51). Though He was fully conscious of His divine being and mission, He lived a life of filial obedience.

5. Jesus' Development (v. 52). (1) Mental. He "increased in wisdom." (2) Physical. He "increased in stature." (3) Spiritual. He "increased in favor with God and man."

Huge Airplane Has Radio

There has been installed on one of the huge Goliath biplanes engaged in the Paris-London aerial service a combined radio telephone and telegraph equipment of 35 watts antenna output, with the sending range of about 150 miles at 900 meters' wave length. The complete radio equipment weighs only 125 pounds. An air-propeller-driven generator for six volts and 700 volts and a six-volt storage battery supply the necessary current. A three-bulb amplifier is used for receiving on all wave lengths between 300 meters and 1,000 meters.—Radio Electrician.

NEW LOCATIONS IN CROSS CUT FIELD ARE ANNOUNCED

Last week's Brownwood Bulletin announces some interesting new developments in the Cross Cut oil field.

Bob Gilman has made a new location, one mile south of the town, one on J. W. Newton tract and expects to be in operation soon.

The Junior Oil Co. Byrd No. 1, has resumed work at 1,400 feet and will undertake to go to 2,800 feet as contracted.

The Gillette Magness Prater No. 1 is on the pump and making 25 barrels. The gas pressure in this well is standing steadily.

Crabb-McNeal have made a location on the land of Mrs. J. W. Elsbury and have a derrick up ready to spud in. This well will be three miles south of town and near the Pennant gasser of T. B. Slick. The gas well is being cleaned and will drill deeper at 2,800 feet. This well has been disconnected from the gas fuel lines and the C. A. Leonard Company-Prater No. 1, a mile southeast will be connected up for fuel, to supply gas to neighboring rigs and to test the value of the wet gas. A casing head plant may be installed later, it is said today. An offset location has been made on the Prater tract and will be pushed to an early completion.

The Strawn drilling Co. Edington No. 1, has resumed drilling after being shut down for fuel and has good oil showing at 2,200 feet.

The Gillette-Magness concern expects to drill three more wells at an early date to the shallow sand at 1320 feet, also the McDonough land south of town is to have a drilling contract soon. Business of all kinds appears to be improving in this field as the drilling operations are increased.

MAY HAVE CLUE TO DISAPPEARANCE OF CISCO MAIL CARRIER

(Cisco Daily News)

What is believed to be a clue to the disappearance of Hugh Maples came Saturday when Chief of Police Horton received a telegram from the city marshal of Killeen inquiring if the body of Maples had yet been found, and requesting Chief Horton to answer by wire collect.

The police department and Mayor Williamson regard this telegraphic inquiry as significant, believing that some evidence has been discovered in Killeen that will shed some light upon the mysterious disappearance of Maples. Unless something has developed it is hardly reasonable that the Killeen marshal would send the telegram, and request an answer by wire collect it is pointed out by the police department.

Chief Horton answered the message promptly, and requested the Killeen official to inform him if any developments had been made.

Another significant fact, it is pointed out relative to the inquiry, and that is that Killeen is the last place where Tom Molar or his family were seen. Molar, who has been ascertained to be the man leaving Cisco with Maples on August 10th, was last seen at Killeen when he removed his family from that place to parts unknown.

Since Molar's departure Cisco county officers have been very diligent in hunting him.

It is stated that Molar's family is expecting to hear something that will throw some light upon the mysterious disappearance of the mail carrier in the near future. He advanced the theory that the Killeen marshal has either apprehended Molar, or a body may have been discovered.

PLATFORM DEMAND TO BE EXPLAINED

Texas Highway Association to Conduct Campaign of Education.

Waco, Tex.—The Texas Highway Association, with headquarters here, is preparing to conduct a campaign of education between now and the regular session of the Legislature to call attention to the full meaning of the highway plank in the Democratic platform adopted at San Antonio.

The platform declares in favor of a State system of highways but recognizes that without Federal aid such a system cannot be built. It then accepts the provisions of the recent act of Congress, which declares that in the near future Federal cooperation in road building will be extended to those States only that provide that the State, through a properly authorized and equipped agency, shall finance from funds under the direct and exclusive control of the State the construction, maintenance and operation of a State system of public highways. The platform then adds the following:

"We therefore recommend and urge upon the 38th Legislature the necessity for favorable action on all legislation, whether constitutional or statutory, that may be deemed requisite to enable the State to take over the construction, maintenance, control and operation of a system of public highways without prejudice to the constitutional rights of the counties and of the State."

The Texas Highway Association calls attention to the fact that what this proposes is to give the State Government the authority to construct a State "system" and to maintain and operate that system. Under the Federal law such a "system" shall not exceed seven per cent of the total post road mileage of the State, so far as Federal aid is concerned. In Texas this seven per cent system would embrace about 12,000 miles of highways, touching practically every county in the State. The authority it is proposed to give the State over to this system would not interfere with the powers and jurisdiction of the counties over the remaining 93 per cent of the roads now showing any of their present revenues nor the powers of raising revenue.

The Association points out that it is necessary to pass such legislation in order to continue to receive Federal aid for highway construction in Texas, and it is necessary also if a State system of highways, such as is being constructed in other States, is ever to be a realized fact in Texas.

WILL TEXAS FORFEIT FEDERAL AID?

According to the Texas Highway Association, Texas receives five dollars from the Federal Government for highway construction for every dollar which this State contributes in taxes to the Federal highway fund. The other four dollars are paid in by other States. Texas receives more Federal aid for highways annually than any other State in the Union. But this Federal aid is threatened, the association points out, unless the laws of Texas are changed to conform to Federal regulations. The State laws that are raising the extra Federal taxes being spent in Texas have conformed. The association is carrying on a campaign to have the necessary changes made in our laws.

HIGHWAY CRISIS IS NOT REALIZED

Highway Association President Says Organization Needed to Waken People.

Waco, Tex.—The chief reason Texas is still without adequate highway laws, and is now threatened with a discontinuance of Federal aid, is that the facts have never been properly presented to the people.

VALUABLE "FROGS" AT LARGE

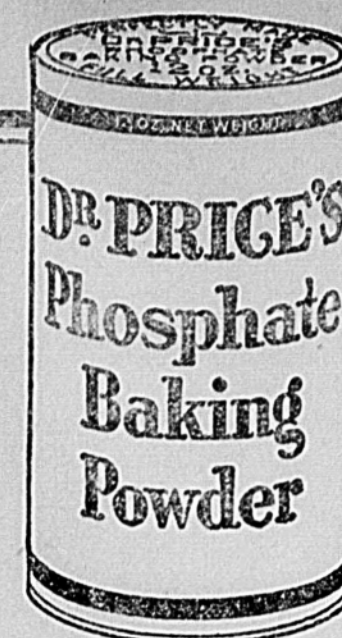
JIM NED WELL MAY BE BIG PRODUCER

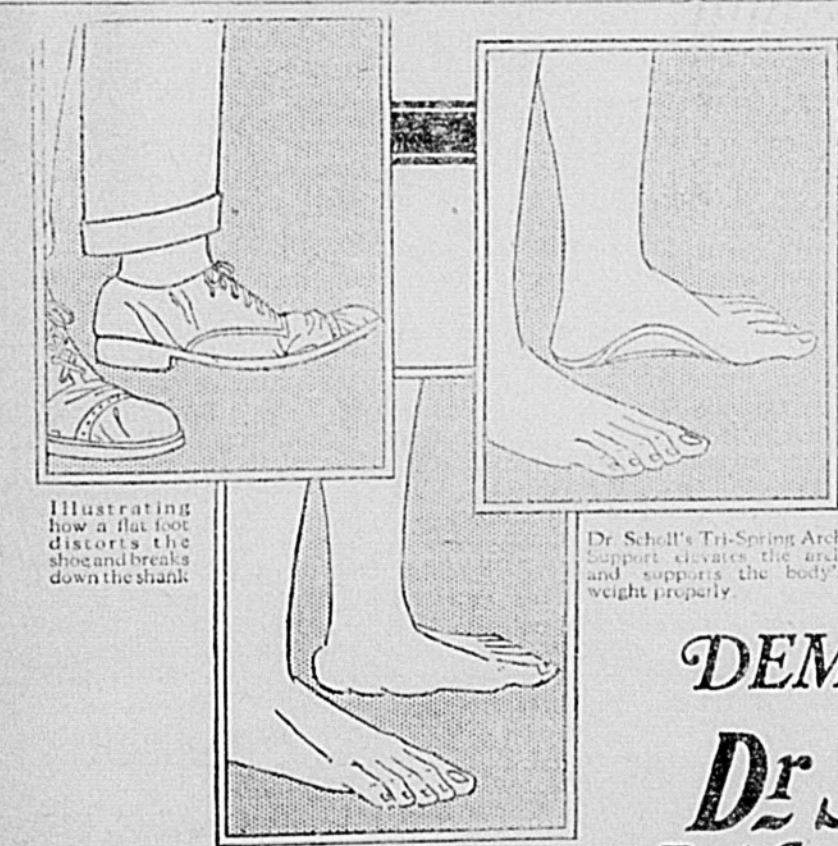

It was ornate, elegant, tasteful, decorative and all that sort of thing—in one word, nifty. It had a reputation; every other office in the building was compared with it, and few reached a rating as high as 50 per cent.

But in the fullness of time the occupant thereof moved on—specifically to New York, where all good Washingtonians go if they can stand the climate—and the office was closed. The glory of this particular building had departed, until, recently, another sumptuous, luxurious and pomme de terre establishment blossomed out therein.

Naturally, of course, old timers in the building began comparing it with the one that had excited so much comment in the past. It was about 50-50. Some thought it was even more elaborate; others thought it was equally so, and some thought it wasn't so much.

And who knows how long the debate might have gone on, bootlessly and futilely, had not the discovery suddenly been made that the two offices had the identical furniture, even to the waste basket?

PHONOGRAPH AIDS HER GOLF

Player Makes Public Method of Improvement on Which There Is No Patent as Yet.

Take your phonograph along when you play golf and it may be that you can play better golf.

If you have been making the course, perchance, in 100 strokes, you may be able to reduce your game to, say, 80 strokes, or thereabouts.

Such a demonstration was eminently successful on one of the leading golf courses in Cleveland recently. It was conducted under the guidance of Miss Edna Tenlopen, golf expert, musician, society pet and personal friend of President Harding.

Miss Tenlopen told about it not long ago while in Los Angeles, says the Express of that city. She was

entertaining a number of friends in her home. Also, she had just purchased a dozen or more new phonograph records. Some of the friends wanted to go out to the country club and play golf, and others wanted to remain and hear the records.

Miss Tenlopen solved the problem by taking a small phonograph to the golf course and continued to play the new records while her guests rambled gayly over the green. And she declares that every one of them played the best golf of their lives.

IMPROVED SOUND BOX

Anything that eliminates sound waves that are disturbing to those produced by the action of the record itself, in phonographic devices, will naturally improve the reproduction of instrumental and vocal music. This is said to be done in a patented phonographic sound box, described in Popular Mechanics Magazine, of the usual shape, having the usual vibratory diaphragm at one end, and between that and the outlet of a series of disks with registering openings, gradually decreasing in number toward the outlet, so that the sound waves are not affected by the sound box itself.

MEASURING THE OCEAN

The Navy department has been working on a device for measuring ocean depths by means of reflected sound waves, but as yet has not perfected it to a point where it wishes to give out information regarding it. A recent German device of similar nature has been developed, by means of which depth measurements, accurate to within one foot, can be made even when the ship is moving at full speed.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

RESCUE CAR FROM ARGONAUT MINE TO BE AT STATE FAIR

STATE FAIR CROWDS TO SEE DEMONSTRATION OF RESCUE WORK OF FIREMEN

A big feature of the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Oct. 6-15, will be demonstrations of rescue work by the crew of the mine rescue car which worked so faithfully at the recent Argonaut mine disaster, at Jackson, Calif.

The demonstration will be given in connection with a life-saving and rescue exhibition by members of the Dallas fire department, under Fire Chief Myers. A building is being erected before the grand stand, from which, as flames and smoke pour from its windows, a person supposed to have been overcome by gas and smoke, will be rescued.

Carried from the burning building by the firemen, the work of resuscitation, as obtains at a mine, will be carried out by the crew of the mine car.

The car will be sent to Dallas by order of the Bureau of Mines, and will be in charge of Foreman Miner W. F. Sullivan. The orders have been issued by the Bureau of Mines at Pittsburgh, Pa.

VETERAN CHALLENGES ALL COMERS TO WALKING MATCH

John W. Dixon, a veteran of the Civil War, seventy-six years of age, has challenged all comers, over forty, to meet him in a five-mile walking contest on the State Fair grounds race track, Confederate Day at the Fair, Oct. 11. Mr. Dixon says he can do the five miles in an hour, and the only restriction he puts on his opponent is that he shall not be any taller than himself. Much interest has been manifested in the competition.

"SING-SONGS" TO BE FEATURE AT STATE FAIR

Massed sing-songs, such as proved so popular during the world-war, will be a feature at the State Fair of Texas, Dallas, Oct. 6-15. Arrangements have been made for three big screens to be erected before the grand stand. On these, through projecting machines, the words of popular songs will be thrown. A song leader will start the words, and to the accompaniment of a big massed band, the old familiar airs will be sung by thousands.

The race track at the State Fair grounds, Dallas, has been put in first-class condition for the world famous drivers who will try for new speed records there, Oct. 7, 8, 10, 14 and 15.

Lillian Boyer, the girl flyer, who will appear at the State Fair, Dallas, Oct. 6-15, electrified thousands at the Illinois Fair, Springfield, according to Springfield newspapers.

At the fair grounds at 1 p. m. Mr. Olmsted will introduce Mayor Sawala R. Aldredge, who in turn will present S. D. Chestnut of Kennedy, Texas, president of the Texas Press Association. Mr. Chestnut will deliver the address on the part of the newspaper men. The introduction and the addresses will be given over the telephone "loud speaker."

Henry Edwards of the Troop Zanner and Lee J. Rountree of the Bryan Eagle, both veterans of the Texas newspaper fraternity, will also be heard.

As a concluding feature of the program, there will be an address by Earle B. Mayfield, democratic nominee for the United States senate, which will be delivered at Austin and brought in and broadcasted to the gathered newspaper folk over the telephone loud speaker.

CITIZENS OF EUREKA SPRINGS, ARK., "CLEAN UP" ON BANK ROBBERS

Three of five bandits who attempted to rob the First National Bank at Eureka Springs, Ark., at noon Wednesday of last week, were killed and the other two captured in a running fight with citizens of that town, which followed the sounding of the burglar alarm at the bank.

Si Williams, 40 years old, George Price, 40 years old, and Chas. Price, 25, all of Cookston, Okla., were killed. Mark Hendricks of Park Hill, Okla., and a man named Cowan, driver of one of the bandit cars, were wounded.

None of the half dozen citizens who engaged the bandits in the battle were wounded.

All of the \$14,000 in cash and \$60,000 worth of which the bandits ran from the bank at the opening of the battle was recovered.

The bandit did not enter the vault where a large amount of money was lying within reach.

E. G. Smith, cashier of the bank, sounded the alarm by stepping on a section of the bank floor which was connected with the burglar alarm.

Citizens in the meantime began hurrying to the vicinity of the bank and taking up vantage points in doors and windows from which they commanded the bank entrance.

Becoming alarmed Cowan started to drive away. A shot was fired at his car by G. E. Burson, cashier of the bank of Eureka. The shot did not take effect, however, Burson not firing directly at the driver because he was not certain it was a bandit car.

Almost at the same moment the bandits broke into the open and dashed for the cars. Their appearance was signal for concerted firing by the citizens.

Wilson dropped instantly killed by the first shot said to have been fired by Jordan, the jeweler who stood in the open in the street with Constable, Homer E. Brittain.

The other four were wounded in quick succession, the Price brothers dying in the Huntington Hospital where the four were taken. They each live more than an hour after being shot.

Before dying Wilson fired at Jordan at such short range that the jeweler's face was powder burned.

George Price was shot down by Brittain, who engaged Hendricks in a short range duel. The latter emptied a 45 automatic pistol, but failed to hit the officer. Brittain shot the bandit down, the bullet striking him in the stomach.

Charles Price is said to have fallen victim to shots fired by Joe McHoney an attorney.

Cowan got further from the scene of the robbery than any of the other bandits. He was wounded in front of Jess Litrel's store, nearly a block from the bank. Litrel stepped from his store and fired a shot gun into Cowan's body, almost at the same time Sam Harison taxicab driver, shot Cowan with a revolver. Both charges struck him in the neck and shoulders.

The battle lasted less than five minutes and with the exception of Cowan, none of the bandits got farther than across the street.

All the bandits were dressed in overalls, and none was masked.

Both the wounded bandits are expected to recover.
