TRENCH SILOS BEING DUG TO **OFFSET HIGH PRICE OF FEED**

The cost of wintering cattle this winter will be very high with the present cost of feed. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, says farmers in Donley County are preparing for this by putting in trench silos. Feed that is late and corn, and also well matured feed make the best of silage and will cut the cost of wintering cattle almost in half. Five farmers in the Bray community have gone together and bought a field ensilage harvester. The five men are V. C. Waddell, W. M. Snelson, H. L. Morgan, W. F. Maddox and Calvin Dorman. This ensilage field harvester was financed by the Farm Home Administration in Donley County under the supervision of Mr. James Gouldy who is local supervisor.

The digging of the trench silos and filling is being done by County agent H. M. Breedlove. GOSPEL MEETING AT The five silos in this community will each hold about one hundred tons. The digging of the silos will be completed by the first part of next week or the latter part of this week. Any one is welcome to go to one of these farms and look over the silos.

The actual filling of the silos will start later this fall when the feed becomes more mature but before it starts to dry up or the leaves turn brown. The reason for this is, if the leaves are green then very little or no water at Brooks Dry Goods all is needed.

Therefore, first consideration should be given to seeding cotton and children attended a reunion land to a winter crop that will

protect the soil next spring. Seeding the cover crop of rye, wheat, austrian winter peas, hairy vetch, or a mixture of these also. in the cotton middles in the latter part of August or September before the cotton is harvested is the best method.

There are several ways to plant the cover crop without injury to the cotton. The seed may be sown by hand and covered with the cultivating plows. Some farmers use a regular grain drill and remove the appropriate discs to miss the cotton rows.

Several farmers have had good success adapting the old one-row horse-drawn drills to their trac-

The District has two drills especially designed for seeding cover crops in cotton middles. These seeders may be rented from the District at 25c per acre. Farmers are urged to locate their cover crop seed now and be ready to plant as soon as moisture conditions are favorable.
