Summer Tips For Poultrymen



Broilers, replacement pullets, and layers easily adjust to cool temperatures but hot weather presents a problem.

The hanging-type lar feeders allow the feed once daily

with earth and place shades over waterers to keep the water cool. Water is the most important yet the least expensive item in poultry production.

Ventilation and insulation are key factors in beating the heat. Aluminum roofs and roofs painted white reflect the sun's rays. Open houses to provide plenty of ventilation and check it several times daily. Deep litter prevents the birds from coming in contact with

Broilers, replacement pullets, and layers easily adjust to cool temperatures but hot weather presents a problem.

In summer an abundance of fresh, cool water helps keep hens in production and young birds growing. One hundred 8-week-old birds need at least 8 feet of drinking space and 100 layers need 7 gallons of water per day, and more when temperatures are high.

Arrange waterers so that confined birds travel not more than ten feet to the supply. Place range water pipes in furrows and cover with earth and place shades over waterers to keep the water cool.



Starch And Shape Hats



Be your own hat designer! Make summer hats out of any fabric that takes starch. It's easy! Cut the fabric in a circle, soak it in liquid starch and use kitchen utensils for the form over which you shape it. The starch stiffens it so the hat holds its shape.

The depth of the crown and the width of the brim determines the size of the fabric circle you need. For this hat, made of burlap, use a 16-inch circle of the fabric, saturate it in undiluted Sta-Flo liquid starch, and mold over a salad bowl set slightly off center on a frying pan. Hem by turning edges under while still wet. Hair clips can be used to hold the fabric in place while the hat is drying.

Lift off the form and allow to dry thoroughly. Then remove the clips and tack on contrasting rope and flowers for the finishing touch.



"Tax Alternatives For Texas"

AUSTIN - "Tax Alternatives and fertilizer. Thomas Feed for Texas" are examined in the current issue of Public Affairs (4tfc) Comment, bi-minthly publication of the University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs.

Since local governments have tax until its possibilities "are strained to the limits," the state government is left to choose between "some kind of tax based our income and some kind based one (6-2c) sales," he concludes.


