



Expenditures for both hunting and fishing in this state last year was placed at \$165,054,000, with the bulk (\$122,919,000) spent for fishing. The average money layout per fisherman over twelve years of age was \$86.69, and per hunter was \$59.43.

"This survey clinches the realization that times not only have changed so far as pastimes are concerned but that the trend toward personal participation even spare time was so limited that he was confined to an occasional hour stalking a deer or at the billiard hall.
