





## SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Before income tax filing time, every self - employed farmer should make sure he has his social security number and that he knows how he is to report his numbers are self-employment for social security credit, John R. Sanderson, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in Amarillo, Texas, said today.

Old-age insurance payments to a self-employed farmer and his wife at age 65 and to his survivors on his death are based upon these reports of his net earnings of \$400 or more yearly. As a self-employed person, he will pay a 3 percent social security tax on his net earnings up to \$4200 in a year. This payment goes in as a part of his income tax return. Net earnings means the amount of income from farm operation after deducting farm operating expenses. These expenses (not living expenses) must be listed unless gross earnings are not over \$1800, in which case the farmer can report half of his



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



#### TEXAS FARM CASH INCOME CONTINUES TO DECLINE

AUSTIN - The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports a continuing decline in Texas farm cash income.

The January-October total for 1955 is \$1.3 billion, 8 per cent below the figure for the first 10 months of 1954.

Only seven of 19 major farm commodities showed increases: corn, 2 per cent; grain sorghum, 9 per cent; peanuts, 128 per cent; sheep and lambs, 12 per cent; mohair, 48 per cent; eggs, 3 per cent, and fruit and vegetables, 15

per cent. The 12 commodities registering decreases were: cotton, 9 per cent; cottonseed, 29 per cent; wheat, 31 per cent; oats, 19 per cent; flaxseed, 61 per cent; rice, 6 per cent; cattle, 4 per cent; calves, 34 per cent; hogs, 28 per born January 10th in a Memphis cent; wool, 24 per cent; poultry, 1 per cent, and milk and milk products, 1 per cent.







"The selective kill of gizzard shad by rotenone," he said. "is being continued and a promising new method of applying powdered cube in its dry form into the water is being explored.

"One project concerns the Woodville Fishing Club Lake which was drained during 1955. A survey before the lake was tested indicated that 51.7 per cent of the fish population was shad. Actual counts were made of fish removed at the time of the draining and revealed that large mouth bass were plentiful, since 2063 bass or 44.8 per cent of these fish per acre were counted, many weighing two pounds or more.

"Furthermore, 11,225 crappie mostly fingerlings were removed. These comprised 22.10 per cent of the population. In addition, 27,658 sunfish or 54.43 per cent of the population were removed. The selective kill conducted on the lake didn't kill all of the gizzard shad since 6,468 were counted, but their percentage of composition was dropped to 12.73 per cent of the total fish present.

"In a search for suitable predacious fishes that could be introduced, the inland fishery division has been working in close conjunction with the marine division and plantings of channe bass and spotted squeteagues have been made, particularly in inland lakes having a fairly high chlorine content, Channel bass released in Lake Kemp (near Wichita Falls) have shown excellent growth over a period of several months duration. Seven fish have been taken thus far by anglers out of a plant of 27 channel bass.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist cited the work of contract fishermen as a factor in rough fish removal, reporting that approximately one half of the state's waters closed to netting yielded 1,171,495 pounds of gar, suckers, buffalo and carp during the year. Congratulations F.F.A. and 4-H BOYS





New Insecticide Developments

Experiments with a new chemical which promises to be even more effective than DDT in combatting the pink bollworm are being held on test plots over the state. The new chemical, Bayer No. 17147, is also believed to be effective against the boll weevil, whereas DDT is successful against pink bollworms only. It is also probable that fewer applications of the Bayer phosphorous compound would be necessary than the periodic treatments required when DDT is used.




