





Annulment Differs

In this case the court must determine whether there ever was a valid marriage. If the court agrees with the plaintiff, the decree says in effect that the couple never was legally and validly married, and is not now.

Such a decree of annulment establishes for the public record the fact that the marriage was and is invalid according to law. Children Protected

Whether the action takes the form of a divorce or an annulment, the decree will have no effect on the legitimacy of the couple's children. Our statutes provide that the children of couples whose marriages have been declared null shall never-





Soil Builder Confusion

The recent boom in synthetic soil conditioners is one of the most interesting commercial phenomena in many years.

Ever since last December, when one of the world's largest chemical companies announced the development of a synthetic organic soil conditioner, the number of alleged "conditioners" has grown rapidly. Claims and counterclaims for these conflicting brands can easily confuse the

A "magic chemical" to treat the soil has long been needed. It is a well known fact that soil may be well limed and have an abundant supply of fertilizers and yet not be very productive because of bad crusting on top and poor physical condition underneath. Small wonder, then, that the announcement of an effective soil conditioner late last year caused such a stir.

Many people swamped agricultural agencies with requests for this new product even before the discovering company was ready for full production. It was only natural that other companies rushed to "get on the band


But a good soil conditioner is not as easy to produce as it might seem. The original company's research staff had been working on its product for many years before any mention was made to the public. When it was announced, they had a fully tested organic were known. This substance, a grayish white powder, was recommended for use at one pound to 100 square feet of soil. It worked in the soil, doing away with crusting and gave the treated area the characteristics of good garden loam, manufacturers said. In the first few months after the initial announcement, the Soils Department of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station tested more than two dozen possible substitutes that were brought in by producers for examination. Of these, only three were found to be effective. Some of the quickly developed products were declared to be virtualy worthless. Others might or



Five-Year Farm **Outlook Indicates** More Production

A nation-wide survey has been recently completed which offers some reassuring figures to those who fear we may have reached

a peak in agricultural production. The study indicates that in the next four or five years, farmers of the nation can produce about 20 percent more than they did in 1950, and 18 per cent more than in 1951 if there is a need for such a volume, and provided that steps

necessary to assure it are taken. Agriculture is the foundation on which to build for national defense. No one can dispute that high and efficient production of food is necessary if any government is to survive - in war or peace. The survey was prepared as a possible guide for future

agricultural plans. This report of capacity to priduce in a defense period is the combined work of Land-Grant colleges and Departments of Agriculture of the various states. Federal and state workers, thoroughly familiar with farming in their areas, prepared the report. The results represent neither a goal nor a forecast if future production. It does, however, indicate potential capacity, or the rate at which farmers could increase production under favorable condi-

The farmer could, under "favorable conditions", produce about a fifth more of both crops and livestock than he did in 1950. Nationally, the projected increase s based on estimates that he could increase hog output 12 per cent above that of 1951, cattle and calves, 14 per cent; milk, 12 per cent; commercial broilers, 30 per cent; eggs, 12 per cent; corn, 21 per cent; wheat, 40 per cent;



DICK RUSSELL **BACKS ADLAI**

RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR WHOM GOVERNOR SHIVERS AND TEXAS JELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON ALL BALLOTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVEN-TION IN CHICAGO

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, the man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. Allan Shivers sup-ported on all ballots at the national Democratic convention in Chicago, predicted last week that Adlai Stevenson and John J. Sparkman will be elected by one of the largest majorities given a national ticket in recent years.




